

# BRUTAL WHIPPING OF 2-YEAR-OLD BOY LANDS MAN IN JAIL

Three-lashed Flog Is Used by 200-Pound Prisoner in Bayonne, N. J.

BAYONNE, N. J., June 15.—Charged with beating Benedict Richurs, two and one-half years old, with a whip with three lashes, Dominick Socous, forty, was held yesterday in \$5,000 bail for the Grand Jury. The child was left with the Socous family while his father went out to work. His mother is dead.

On the complaints of neighbors, who said they had heard the child crying, Mrs. Elizabeth Feury, executive secretary of the Public Schools

Welfare Department, and Mrs. Mary Given, district nurse, went to the house. They said the child's back and chest were covered with welts. Socous admitted, they said, that he beat the child "when he did not mind."

Recorder Cain described the attack upon the child as the "most brutal" ever reported to him.

"No punishment can be too severe for such a man. We ought to go back to the days of the Indians and run him through a gauntlet of stones and hatchets."

Socous weighs about 200 pounds.

# GIRL KICKED OUT AS THEFT SUSPECT SUES BRYN MAWR

Reputation Stained, Career Destroyed Without Chance to Clear Name, Says Student.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., June 15.—Suit was begun against Bryn Mawr college in the Montgomery county court yesterday by the mother of a dismissed student who seeks to clear her daughter of suspicion of petty thievery.

of Miss Marjory Barker, of Michigan City, Ind., as a student.

Mrs. Barker avers that, by reason of her daughter's dismissal, the girl has been denied the opportunity of studying in Bryn Mawr and other colleges and that her studies "have been interrupted and hindered, a terrible stain has been put on her reputation and character, which she is powerless to remove without the aid of the court, and her hope of a career has been utterly destroyed."

The petition reveals that on Jan. 21 several petty thefts of money were reported by students in Stembroke Hall, where Miss Barker lived.

On March 23 Miss Barker was notified by Miss Hilda W. Smith, dean of the college, that she was under suspicion. Miss Barker insisted that she be allowed to remain during the Easter vacation, which began that day, to clear herself, and left the college only with the assurance given by Dean Smith that she might return after the vacation and clear herself.

That assurance was disregarded, according to the petition, and when Miss Barker sought to return to Bryn Mawr on April 2 she would not be re-admitted.

# BANDIT MORTALLY WOUNDED IN FIGHT AFTER ROBBERY

Man Leaps Into Tree From Elevated Car Line—Shot by Policeman.

NEW YORK, June 15.—A thrilling pistol duel on the structure of the elevated section of the Jerome avenue line, between a bandit and a policeman, marked a lively chase in the Bronx yesterday.

The robber, halted by the policeman's shots, leaped from the structure into a tree. The limb which he grasped broke. He puffed forty feet to the street. When the policeman and the robber's victim reached him

he was unconscious and dying. The body was recovered.

Stephen Flannery, collector for the Esauel Reeves grocery stores, with a wallet containing \$1,200, left the store at noon yesterday. He was in a small automobile. A stranger asked him for a lift, and he told the man to jump in.

The machine had proceeded to Featherbed lane and Jerome avenue when the stranger drew a revolver and ordered Flannery to throw up his hands. He took a wallet from the collector's pocket and then ordered him to drive south. The robber ran north to the One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street station of the subway.

Flannery picked up Patrolman Lorimer and gave chase. The fugitive ran up the stairs, with the policeman after him. He jumped to the tracks and ran south. They interchanged shots. Finally the robber dropped his revolver and jumped into the tree.

At Pordham Hospital he recovered consciousness enough to say that he was James McGarry, of 620 Lexington avenue. The physicians at the hospital believe that his back is broken.
