Harding to Address Senate This Afternoon

HOT BATTLE OVER BONUS REQUEST IS EXPECTED

Lodge and Curtis Silent After Reading Long Message President Will Deliver Today.

By J. BART CAMPBELL. International News Service. President Harding now plans to address the Senate on the question of the bonus this afternoon, probably at about 2 o'clock, it was learned at the White House.

The President completed his message this morning, and it was sent to the public printer. It is understood that the message is about 2,000 words in length.

Senators Lodge and Curtis were permitted yesterday to examine the draft of the message, but both declined to indicate whether they had approved it, or had offered any changes in it.

The President and the Republican leaders of the Senate supporting him realize that they face a bitter fight when a motion to recommit the bill to the Senate Finance Committee, from which it was reported favorably, is made after the delivery of his message.
