

LEGION ASSAILS BONUS DELAY AS RANK SUBTERFUGE

Charges Attempts Made to Influence Organization in Favor of Postponement.

Plans of the Administration to defer action on the soldier bonus legislation were roundly denounced by the American Legion in an official statement here late yesterday.

The statement asserted that the Legion had been approached "from numerous influential sources by those seeking its acquiescence in the proposed postponement."

"The American Legion can do no such thing," said the statement. "The seventh hour order from one end of Pennsylvania avenue to the other is intellectually dishonest, economically unwarranted and politically ludicrous."

Calling attention to the letter of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, the Legion asserted that nowhere in that statement was there any reasonable justification for the theory that a bill, not designed to become effective until July 1, 1922, would "ruin the country if passed now, but be safe and sound if passed in November."

"Ex-service men did not fall to observe," continued the statement, "that news dispatches in the very same editions which carried the secretary's statement against the adjusted compensation bill to the effect that the Government was to be called upon to loan the railroads of the country \$500,000,000."

"The American Legion is irrevocably committed to the Adjusted Compensation bill, popular opinion is behind it, and Congress should pass it and get it out of the way."
"The proposed postponement is merely a subterfuge, a play for time, through which its enemies ultimately hope to defeat the measure. Further delay by Congress in meeting this just obligation will only aggravate a situation which is already deplorable enough."

GERMAN PAPER KNOCKS U. S. PEACE RESOLUTION

BERLIN, July 12.—"No economic benefits offered by the United States could be sufficiently attractive to voluntarily induce Germany to affix for the second time her signature to the disgraceful peace of Versailles, with all its humiliations, privations, and confession of German guilt," says the industrialist and conservative organ, Der Tag, commenting on the

Porter-Knox resolution ending the state of war between the United States and Germany, the text of which only now has been made known here.
The conditions contained in the resolution, adds the paper, should effectively dispel the notions still harbored in some German minds to the effect that the oldest democracy of western civilization, through its new administration, would afford Germany a ray of hope.

HARDING FLEADED FOR ATTEMPTS TO SIDETRACK BONUS

Senator Pat Harrison Attacks President in Fiery Speech on Delay in Soldier Relief

President Harding was attacked in the Senate yesterday by Senator Pat Harrison, Democrat of Mississippi, for urging that the Senate defer action on the soldiers' bonus bill until after tariff and tax legislation has been disposed of.

"In his speeches during last year's campaign and when and after he assumed office, the President pledged there would be no undue executive interference with the legislative branch," Harrison said, "and yet we find him coming to the Capitol now and buttonholing Republican senators to induce them to change front on the soldiers' bonus bill and recommit it to the Senate finance committee."

"Democratic senators were accused during the Wilson administration of being 'rubber stamps' of Mr. Wilson," Harrison continued. "We are not ashamed of having been 'rubber stamps' in the enactment of constructive legislation for the welfare of the people."

BIG BUSINESS, ANSWER.

"Why does President Harding come buttonholing Republican senators in an attempt to choke off soldiers' bonus and other legislation he and his friends do not want? I am not in the President's confidence like some of the Republican leaders who are now agreeing with the President that the soldier's bonus should be side-tracked and buried in the Senate finance committee, but the attention of the soldiers of America to the conference President Harding has held recently with men like J. Ogden Armour, John Wanamaker and other mouthpieces of 'big business.' Perhaps, the answer lies there."

"This is not the first time he has sought to interfere with the Republican majority. He has tried to interfere when the peace resolution was passed by the Senate. It was his interference that held it up in the House."

Harrison accused the Republican leaders of the Senate, "at the President's behest," of having "killed" the Norris packer control bill so that the House substitute, "written by the packers themselves," he declared, could be passed instead, and the President "saved them from having to veto a bill the packers did not want."

CRINGE UNDER PARTY LASH.

"And now the President puts his foot down on the soldiers' bonus bill," Harrison said, "and after Senator Penrose, the chairman of the Senate finance committee, and other Republican leaders of the Senate are on record as urging its immediate passage, the President asks these Republican Senators to reverse themselves after all but one—Senator Warren of New Jersey—has voted to make the bonus bill the unfinished business."

"But they will not fool the soldiers of America. Two years ago the House first passed the soldiers' bonus bill since that time it has been knocked around Congress with Republican Senators protesting to the American Legion that it will be passed soon."

"Oh! If the soldiers of America only knew what was going on behind closed doors and in secrecy at the White House and in the Republican cloak rooms of the Senate they would not be hoodwinked for a moment."

EDGE INTERPOSES.

"The senator of Mississippi was one of those who cringed to the Wilson administration, and joined with those who sought to sell the independence and sovereignty of the American people abroad," interposed Senator Edge, Republican of New Jersey. "He was one of those who cringed behind the foreign policy of Mr. Wilson and was one of the houthpieces of the recent Democratic administration. It is not surprising that he should find fault with the efforts of President Harding."
