

GIRL IS GAGGED AND ROBBED BY POLITE THIEVES

Boardwalk Hotel at Atlantic City Scene of \$15,000 Jewel Theft.

ATLANTIC CITY, Sept. 1.—Interrupted while dressing for dinner by two men, masked and armed with revolvers, who entered her room in a boardwalk hotel here, Miss Anna Knoche, of Philadelphia, was gagged and bound and robbed of jewelry valued at nearly \$15,000 Monday night.

Despite the precautions of the hotel authorities and the police the robbery became known. Miss Knoche, at police headquarters, viewed a line-up of prisoners and the Rogues Gallery, but was unable to pick out her assailants.

Miss Knoche was found bound under the covers of the bed in her room, where she was placed by the robbers to prevent her from giving an alarm. Search of her bureau disclosed that the robbers had stolen all the jewelry she brought here on her vacation.

Despite their rude intrusion, the robbers were unusually polite in the way they went about their business. Although she pleaded through her gag that they release her, the robbers refused, but they assured her again and again that they did not like to treat her in this unseemly manner.

"We can't help it, lady. It's gotta be done. An' if we let you loose you'll yell. And that wouldn't do at all, at all," they told her.

Lifting her gently, they carried her to the bed and there piled the blankets high over her. Quickly they searched her clothes and the bureau and dressing table; then quietly departed.

Half an hour later a girl companion knocked at Miss Knoche's door, found it unlocked, opened it and entered. The alarm was quickly given, but the robbers had escaped.

German Uniforms Forbidden.

BERLIN, Sept. 1.—President Ebert has issued a decree forbidding persons not belonging to the army to wear uniforms. Breaches of the regulation are punishable by a fine of from \$50 to \$5,000 marks and six months' imprisonment.

40 BARRELS OF WINE USED TO PUT OUT FIRE

Bucket Brigade With Liquor Manages to Save Handsome Lodge.

CARLISLE, Pa., Sept. 1.—Forty barrels of fine elderberry wine proved to be the only effective fire extinguisher yesterday when a fire on the farm of Gilbert Beeten, of this place, destroyed a barn and outbuildings valued at \$10,000.

The flames started to ignite a handsome lodge on the farm and the water on the premises had run out. The bucket brigade was promptly poured on the burning buildings, but, although a bucket brigade worked strenuously for six hours, the buildings were destroyed.

RECOGNITION OF MEXICO IS SEEN IN NEAR FUTURE

Oregon Prepares Message for Congress on Subject. Officials Hopeful.

International News Service. MEXICO CITY, Sept. 1.—President Obregon was prepared today to send an important message to Congress dealing with the negotiations that have been proceeding between the Mexican foreign office and the American State Department relative to recognition.

Congress was scheduled to convene in regular session following a brief vacation and belief was strong among the members that recognition will be accorded by the United States before adjournment is taken.

The President's message has already been prepared and it is understood to deal with the proposed treaty of amity and commerce as well as the negotiations.



ICHANG LOOTING LEADS POWERS TO WARN CHINA


Threat of Internationalizing Port if Disorders Are Resumed.

PEKING, Sept. 1.—Foreign diplomatic representative have communicated with the Peking foreign office regarding the looting incident at Ichang, a treaty port, last June, when much foreign property was damaged. The effect of the representations, according to unofficial information, is that in the event of a recurrence of similar disorders the foreign governments will determine for themselves who may be culpable.

Furthermore, it is understood the communications to the Peking government assume the right to exact damages from the Chinese government. That action was taken after a full discussion at the legations of the respective governments, where internationalization of Ichang was seriously considered.

PRE-WAR PRICES DUE ON OYSTERS; BULK RATES CUT

Season for Festive Bivalve Officially Opens Today—Dredgers Start Operations.

BIVALVE, N. J., Sept. 1.—The aristocratic oyster will be selling at pre-war prices when the season for the festive bivalve opens today.

Stews, frays, raws and oysters in all other styles should be cheaper at the restaurants, cafes and the oyster houses this season. Shippers announce that there will be a cut in the wholesale price, while the cost of milk, crackers, butter and labor have also taken a tumble.

Consequently the oyster epicure may expect a big creamy stew, with lots of oysters and a big bowl of crackers on the side, for 25 or 30 cents.

As a result of the warmer weather, the demand for oysters at the very opening of the season is not expected to be as large as was figured when the weather was cool. The oyster trade will not be brisk until snappy weather comes.

CASTELBERG INQUEST SET FOR TUESDAY IN BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, Sept. 1.—An inquest into the death of Joseph Castelberg will be held at the Northwestern police station next Tuesday. Coroner Inesley said yesterday. Mr. Castelberg died Tuesday morning in the Hebrew Hospital from injuries suffered Monday night when he was crushed between the elevator and the side of the cage in the Emersonian Apartments.

The coroner yesterday declared elevator operators should be required to pass a test and should be licensed. Dorothy Bogel, colored, seventeen years old, 1343 Argyle avenue, will be given a hearing Monday in the Northern police court on a charge of operating an elevator, she being under eighteen years of age.

U. S. TOURISTS HELD UP IN IMMIGRATION CHAOS

ROME, Sept. 1.—Large numbers of American tourists have found themselves without ocean transportation at the end of the journey in Europe due to the chaotic navigation situation existing from Italian ports. The passage of the United States immigration law has caused the wholesale suspension of scheduled departures. In some cases the navigation companies have withdrawn their entire fleet from the New York service.
