FIGHT FOR BEER REOPENS WHEN RECESS CLOSES

Congressmen Expect Drys to Aid 2.75 Measure As Relief From Taxation.

 The liquor fight is to be renewed when Congress meets again. The decks are being cleared today for action and both sides are preparing. Beer is to be the issue over which the opposing forces will clash. The "wet" forces in Congress want a modification of the Volstead act to permit the sale of light beer, and, confronted with a perplexing tax situation, many normally dry members of Congress are turning to the proposal as the best way out of the serious revenue situation with which the administration is confronted. Experts Show Figures. Revenue experts have produced figures showing that by imposing a tax of \$5 a barrel on 2.75 per cent beer, the national treasury would be enriched by anywhere from \$500,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000 yearly—a sum far more than sufficient to ease the tax situation and solve the administration's problem. Senator Calder, Republican of New York, will introduce such a measure in the form of an amendment to general revenue legislation. Its adoption

would nullify the beer section of the Volstead act. Many Senators and Congressmen are receiving stacks of mail endorsing the Calder proposal. Some of it comes from straight dyed-in-the-wool opponents of prohibition, and a great deal of it comes from over-burdened taxpayers who have become convinced that 2.75 beer is more to be desired than increased taxes. Result In Doubt. Meanwhile, the Anti-Saloon League forces, led by Wayne B. Wheeler, are not idle. They are planning to renew the fight in Congress for more stringent regulation of the sale and use of grain alcohol for industrial purposes. What the outcome of the renewed fight will be no one in authority dared predict today, but it is already apparent that the whole liquor question is going to be re-fought with renewed intensity when Congress again settles to its work.

NEW POWER WILL CREATE CONFIDENCE IN BANKERS

Government loans to aid in financing the movement and marketing of domestic farm products probably will not attain large volume, in the opinion of the Treasury Department, it was stated today. The War Finance Corporation, by its readiness to give immediate relief to the agriculture and live-stock interests, will be able to facilitate the extension of credits by bankers without the necessity of making actual loans, in thousands of cases where accommodation is necessary to prevent financial hardship to the producer. The Treasury Department today voiced a view held also by the Federal Reserve Board that the mere fact that Congress has clothed the corporation with the new power and established additional credits from which it can draw has created confidence among bankers, who now will borrow readily and meet demands of producers for accommodation.

DRY ADVOCATES RENEW FIGHT ON ALCOHOL SALES

Congress Will Be Asked to Tighten Laws and Remove Potency.

The Anti-Saloon League is to renew its fight in Congress for better regulation of the sale and use of grain alcohol as soon as Congress meets, according to information here. Best results cannot be had from the Volstead enforcement law, in the belief of the prohibition leaders, until drastic laws have been enacted to control the distribution of grain alcohol. Bootleggers and other violators of the law are said to be able to get the grain alcohol, and by doctoring it turn out potable and saleable imitations of gin and whiskey. Chairman Volstead, of the House Judiciary Committee, will be urged by Wayne B. Wheeler and other Anti-Saloon League leaders, to bring forth on an early day his bill requiring registration of all industrial concerns

using grain alcohol in manufacture of their products, and withdrawal from bonded warehouses of grain alcohol producers the alcohol needed under permits showing the amount required, the uses to which it is to be put, the average hourly consumption, the wastage, and the disposal of the waste. It is probable, also, that the new law to be proposed will require that wherever it can be done without destroying the uses of the alcohol for the industrial purposes for which it is withdrawn, the alcohol shall be doctoring before being withdrawn from bond so that it will not be potable.
