

A lot of talk is being spread from Washington to the effect that if the conference at Washington fails it will be because other nations distrust our willingness to enter into any co-operative agreement.



This is a poor diagnosis. The distrust is not a cause. It is a symptom. The conference may come to much or it may come to nothing. If it comes to nothing it will be because the United States and specifically the majority party, is not agreed on anything it wants to do.

The whole world depends on us. The whole world needs our good-will, partly because we are strong, but far more because we are rich.

PLAGUE IN INDIAN CITY KILLING OFF HUNDREDS

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Hundreds of persons have died of plague in the city of Jubbulpur, British India, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Allahabad. The victims are so numerous, it is said, that it is almost impossible to bury or burn the bodies. The city is reported to be panic-stricken.

Jubbulpur is the capital of a district of the same name in central India and is 200 miles southwest of Allahabad. It is a center of trade and industry. The principal manufactures being cotton goods and carpets. It has a population of 90,000, most of whom are Hindus.

ALFRED WOOD.

Funeral services for Alfred Wood, a resident of the District for more than fifty years, will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from his home, 1712 Corcoran street. Interment will be in Rock Creek Cemetery. Mr. Wood died yesterday, following an illness of about a year.

Mr. Wood was a native of Scotland, born in 1846. He died March 31, 1921. At the outbreak of the civil war he enlisted in Company A, Eighteenth Connecticut Infantry. He fought during the first years of the war, and later was detailed in the adjutant general's office in Washington.

He was a member of Burnside Post, G. A. R.; Association of the Oldest Inhabitants; the Young Men's Christian Association; and was a deacon in the First Congregational Church. Surviving him is his daughter, Miss G. M. Wood.

Funeral services for Thomas W. Fowler, veteran real estate man and father of Dr. William C. Fowler, District health officer, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, from his residence, 1322 Irving street, northwest. Burial will be in Greenwood Cemetery.

Mr. Fowler died yesterday after an illness of two weeks. He was eighty-six years old.

Born in southern Maryland, Mr. Fowler came to Washington when a small boy. He entered the real estate business as a young man, and remained in it until his death.

He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and was identified with Columbia Lodge of Odd Fellows. He also was a member of the Association of the Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Fowler is survived by three sons, Raymond, Chapman W. and Dr. William C. Fowler, and two daughters, the Misses Belle and H. Zulema Fowler.

Hemorrhage of the lungs, following an operation to remove an abdominal abscess, was said to have been responsible for the death last night of Jay Gordon Nettekoven, one of the best-known athletes at Central High School, at the Naval Hospital.

Two weeks ago, young Nettekoven was injured in a football scrimmage. At first it was thought this was responsible for his illness. Physicians who performed the operation, however, believed the illness was resulting from an entirely different cause. He was removed to the Naval Hospital about a week ago.

Young Nettekoven was seventeen years old. He was the son of Capt. Joseph J. Nettekoven, U. S. M. C., of 204 E street northwest. He came to Central High School about two years ago, and rapidly won a place in the hearts of his fellow-students for his quiet ability and genial disposition. Out of respect to his memory, the Central football team voted to cancel the game Saturday with Woodberry Forest.

Nettekoven was a member of Lambda Sigma Fraternity. His funeral will be attended by members of the football team and many high school friends.
