McGurk, who was doing nearby duty, leaped into the chill water, swam out to the struggling horse, loosened the traces and helped it back to shore.

STEEL MAGNATE FOUND GUILTY OF DEFRAUDING

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 25.—Larkin C. Taylor, president of the Pittsburgh Tinplate and Steel Company, was found guilty in court here yesterday on charges of conspiracy to cheat and defraud.

Taylor was indicted for the sale of \$1,000,000 stock of the company on an alleged fraudulent prospectus of the company's properties at Marietta, Ohio. His counsel gave notice that application would be made for a new trial. The jury recommended Taylor to the mercy of the court.

IMPOUNDED SHE-MULE WAS POWERFUL EATER

BEAVER, Pa., Oct. 25.—Beaver Falls' famous mule may not be what she used to be, but at eating she is a decided success. This is attested by a suit entered by attorneys on behalf of C. L. Householder, liveryman, against the borough of Beaver Falls, to recover for the keep of the mule. Householder asks \$1.50 a day for 131 days, a total of \$196.50. The mule was found loafing on the streets a year or more ago, and taken to the borough lockup. The mule ate up Householder's hay, while the case was pending.

26-STORY SKYSCRAPER IS PLANNED FOR BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, Oct. 26.—A skyscraper, from twenty-four to twenty-six stories in height, is to be erected in the heart of the financial district if financing negotiations now under way are consummated, it was learned yesterday. The structure, which will be an office building, is planned for the vacant lot at the northeast corner of South and Water streets and will include the site of the Donnelly Building, at the northeast corner of Commerce and Water streets. It will have a frontage on Water street of 148 feet, a depth of sixty-five on Commerce street and thirty-eight feet on South street.
