



BILL URGES U. S. TO GIVE SURPLUS GOODSTOEUROPE

Senator France Offers Plan Aimed to Aid Needy and Stimulate U. S. Industry.

Distribution of the Government's surplus war supplies as a Christmas gift to the destitute and suffering people in the countries where there now is economic distress or famine, particularly in Russia, China and the Near East, is advocated by United States Senator Joseph Irwin France of Maryland, who has introduced a bill in Congress urging such action.

It is Senator France's aim that the surplus supplies, such as textiles, dry goods, canned food, building material and supplies, metals,

drugs, surgical instruments, chemicals, paints and oils be distributed either through the Departments of War, the Treasury and the Shipping Board directly, or through the various welfare agencies which did work of mercy during the world war.

Seeks to Stimulate Trade. He asks that each of the Government departments report at once to Director Charles G. Dawes, director of the bureau of the budget, the amount of surplus supplies, other than arms, ammunition, and ships, not required by the several departments, and which may be declared available for public sale.

"The disposal of these goods as I have suggested," said Senator France, "would tend to stabilize business, reassure manufacturers, increase employment, relieve the Government of storage charges, release for productive work a large corps of officers and employees who have been in charge of these goods, and would have a wholesome effect generally."

"The adoption of such a measure as this would arouse the interest and enthusiasm of the business men, the manufacturers and the workers of our country, for they would instantly recognize the fact that this measure would remove depressing and demoralizing factors which are causing distress here, and that at the same time these goods would be of an unpeakable and priceless boon to the unhappy sufferers in other lands who will perish from the lack of them."

"The humanitarian side of the question is important. The Russians stand in desperate need of such supplies. The shipment of these supplies to Russia would be an act of humanity and a piece of wise business diplomacy as well."

Will Advertise U. S. Goods. "All these supplies will serve as samples of American-made goods, and may result in future business transactions. The supply of goods which the Government has on hand remain a disturbing factor which is most unsettling to agriculture, industry and business. Merchants are in some cases afraid to buy goods which they may be forced to sell in competition with these Government supplies which at any time may be placed on the market.

"We can look upon the surplus which we have as being saved from the wreckage and scrap which we destroyed it to stimulate production it would in the end be profitable as the Government sales have had a demoralizing effect which the dumping of the supplies in an irregular way is having on our markets."
