

**HEAD OF FIRM ACCUSED OF STEALING \$25,703**  
 ST. LOUIS, Dec. 8.—Herbert C. Camien, president of the accounting firm of Giraldo-Fink-Mamien, with headquarters here, has been indicted on charges of grand larceny and embezzlement, it was announced today by the Circuit attorney.  
 The accounting firm has branches in

New York, Kansas City, Mo.; Columbus, Ohio; Savannah, Ga.; Atlanta, Ga.; Jacksonville and Tampa, Fla., and Springfield, Mo.  
 The charges resulted from work done by Camien between February and October in installing and operating a system of bookkeeping at the Yahlem Motor Company. Members of the Yahlem firm say discrepancies of \$25,703 have been discovered during the time Camien had charge of their books.

**GUATEMALA IS VICTIMIZED BY MINORITY PARTY**

**Dr. Bianchi, Minister to Washington, Declares People Not Behind Rebellion.**

Planned and executed by a small group of radicals, aided by a few disloyal soldiers, the revolution which has overthrown the government of Guatemala can by no means be construed as a "national movement," according to a statement issued today by Dr. Julio Bianchi, minister of Guatemala to the United States. The revolt is not supported by the people of Guatemala, Dr. Bianchi said. A large majority of the inhabitants of Guatemala are Unionists, members of the party which elected Carlos Herrera president by the largest vote ever cast in the history of the country.  
 "As Guatemala is a state in the new republic of Central America," Dr. Bianchi continued, "the revolt is not only against the government of Guatemala, but against the government of the republic of Central America, composed of Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador."  
 "I am advised that steps are being taken by the government of the republic of Central America to suppress the revolt and release President Herrera and members of his cabinet."  
 "The revolt probably could have been prevented by President Herrera had he cared to use all of the powers at his command as the chief executive. Only about two weeks ago a petition signed by the leading citi-

zens of Guatemala was presented to President Herrera, informing him it was public knowledge that a small group of men were planning to remove him from office, that the identity of these men and their activities were known publicly, and asking that he take action to retain his office.  
 "President Herrera knew he had the support of the people and did not desire to imprison or exile men for their political activities. During the year and a half that he has been president, Mr. Herrera has endeavored in every way known to him to eliminate from his government any practices and customs repugnant to democracy and restricting the freedom of the people. He has permitted a freedom of speech and a freedom of the press such as has never before been maintained in his country and has conducted his administration as the government of a real democracy, knowing that he did so at the risk of being removed from office."

"People Will Rise."  
 "It is my belief, based on a knowledge gained by a lifetime study of the people of Guatemala, that they will rise in support of President Herrera, and I regret to say I fear serious consequences. It is not probable that the trouble may spread beyond the borders of Guatemala, for the entire Unionist movement, which recently resulted in uniting Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador in one nation, the republic of Central America, is threatened. The chief hope of the union of these republics, brought about by many years of labor, was to rid Central America for all time of just the kind of revolt by a daring, unscrupulous minority that has occurred in Guatemala."

**ARMS SPENDING RETARDS WORLD REHABILITATION**

**Makes Complex Puzzling Foreign Exchange Problem, Says Reserve Board.**

 Spending of huge sums for armament has made more complex the already puzzling foreign exchange problem, the Federal Reserve Board declared today.  
 "During the past year a large amount of national revenue in most countries has been devoted to development of armaments, thereby preventing the governments from restoring their budgets to equilibrium, and compelling them to rely upon short-term borrowing in an effort

to meet current obligations," the board said in an official bulletin.  
 "The general movement of foreign exchange quotations has shown no broad or uniform improvement. Two factors are contributing to the uncertainty of the foreign exchange situation—the continuously large foreign trade balance of the United States. This has raised the unfunded indebtedness of the United States to a figure approximating \$3,400,000,000. There also is in evidence the unfavorable domestic budget conditions prevailing in the various countries, or lack of balance between receipts from taxation and expenditures."  
 "The difficulty of reducing government outlays has proven to be very great in nearly all countries. This is partly a result of post-war readjustment operations of various kinds, including allowances for unemployment and continued outlays for public objects. Debt charges have also proven to be even more severe an economic burden than had been expected."

**Major Hartman Relieved.**  
 Major Charles D. Hartman has been relieved from duty as constructing quartermaster in this city, it was announced today. He will be succeeded by Capt. Leonard S. Doten, quartermaster corps.

**DUDLEY FIELD MALONE TO WED SUFFRAGE PICKET**

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Dudley Field Malone, Assistant Secretary of State during President Wilson's first term and former collector of the port of New York, and Miss Doris Stevens, of Omaha, Neb., suffrage leader, will be married Saturday and sail immediately for France, it was learned today from members of the bride's family.  
 The discovery of the romance, which had its inception in Washington when Mr. Malone offered his legal services to incorporated White House pickets, including Miss Stevens, came about when it was announced that "Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Field Malone" had engaged passage on the steamship Rotterdam. They will make their home in Paris.  
 Mr. Malone's former wife, a daughter of former United States Senator James A. O'Gorman, obtained a divorce in France last summer. Mr. Malone was a candidate for governor of New York on the Farmer-Labor ticket in 1920.
