"When sixty-year-old women are posing as vamps, you can't expect much of young girls," declared Mrs. Kate W. Barrett, national president of the Florence Crittenden Homes before the twenty-seventh conference of the International Reform Bureau at the Metropolitan Presbyterian Church yesterday afternoon...

COMMISSIONERS WILL ASK HOUSE FOR MORE CASH

Subcommittee to Be Shown Necessity for Some Items Slashed From Budget. The District Commissioners will go before the House Appropriations Committee Monday morning and endeavor to get put back in the District estimates for the fiscal year 1923, some of the items which have been cut out...

One of the principal items eliminated was increased pay for firemen, and public school teachers and officials. An item for a combination firehouse, police station and morgue to be built on the wharves, and which it was estimated would cost \$90,000, was taken out of the bill by the director of the budget. The condition of the harbor precinct, fireboat engine house, and the morgue is considered one of the eyesores of the southwest section of the city, and it was part of the Commissioners' plan to clean up the waterfront probably will have to wait another year.

The Commissioners had available for District needs \$28,075,000 at the tax rate of 2 per cent, according to their estimate. The director of the budget, however, estimated \$27,537,000 to \$24,327,000. In addition to this he added the estimates contained in the executive, legislative and judicial appropriation bill and the Washington Police bill, which were for projects within the District.

It is alleged she took from the cash register on October 4, \$750. The St. Louis police say she implicates her husband, but he is not charged here with any offense.

Sears, corresponding secretary; Mrs. E. W. Osborne, architect, of Baltimore, who reported the building safe for occupancy, but who made recommendations that certain repairs be made.

REVIVAL OF U. S. GRAIN BOARD WILL BE SOUGHT. An attempt to have Congress pass legislation reviving the United States Grain Corporation will be made during the present session, it was announced today by Benjamin C. Marsh, managing director of the Farmers' National Council. The legislation to be asked would provide for a Government guarantee to wheat raisers, assuring them of full price of production, a reasonable profit for the farmer, and a 32-cent bushel, control of wheat products through to the city baker, and prevention of all profiteering in wheat and in wheat products.
