CHICAGO STREET CARS BURN IN \$3,000,000 FIRE

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—More than 100 cars of the Chicago surface street railway lines were burned in a fire which destroyed car barns at Devon and Clark streets on the north side early today. First estimates of the damage run from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000. Approximately 600 cars were in the barns when the fire was discovered, but about 500 of them were run out before the flames reached them.
