DRUGGISTS PUT UNDER CHARGE OF DRY AGENTS

Officials Hear Complaints of "Doctored" Liquor Got on Prescription.

By International News Service.

Druggists holding Government permits to sell liquors on prescription will be forced by prohibition officials of the different States to deal only in real whiskey in supplying the needs of the sick.

Prohibition enforcement orders today to State directors called for strict supervision of druggists' sales of whiskey to safeguard the public against spurious liquors.

Complaints have poured into the offices of officials from all parts of the country, alleging that druggists in certain localities are getting high prices for "doctored" whiskey sold for medicinal purposes.

State prohibition directors have been instructed to inspect the liquor business of permit holders and to make analysis of their sales to customers to establish whether they are dealing honestly with the public.

Some of the complaints to the prohibition bureau charged that it is a common practice for a certain type of druggists to sell for medicinal uses liquors made out of grain alcohol and caramel coloring.

BRITISH ASKED JAPANESE AID TO QUELL INDIA

Sallendra N. Ghose Insists Nippon Was Approached to Supply Military.

Sallendra N. Ghose, director of the American Commission to Promote Self-Government in India, today reiterated his statement of last week to the effect that the British Government had approached the Japanese government with a request for military assistance in the event of a general uprising in India.

Denials issued by the India office in London and by the Japanese embassy in Washington that Britain had requested military assist-

ance if there was an uprising in India, were to be expected, but may be taken as purely diplomatic, Mr. Ghose said. Not only has the possibility of Japanese intervention in India on the side of the British been discussed formally in London and Tokyo, but during the Washington conference on limitation of armaments it was discussed by the heads of the British and Japanese delegations.

FROM CONGO'S WILDS HE GOES TO SCHOOLROOM

A. B. Tugman, Now a Professor, Invaded Wilds of Africa As Youth.

Washington is a city of specialties and superlatives. Its list of things which are "best," buildings which are "largest," organizations which are "greatest" and people who are "only"—is large indeed.

Now comes the latest discovery. You might have assumed that a language professor is a language professor—with most of the earlier years of a lifetime untouched by the thrills of far-off adventure. Wrong, again!

Alfred Best Tugman teaches languages in a little school at 8 Iowa Circle. But turn back to the chapters of youth.

Tugman is now the only living survivor of the Belgian Congo Expedition and the survey of the upper Congo. Though only a young man of twenty-one years, he was given the position of official interpreter for the expedition, and remained in Africa from '82 to '85. Today he looks backward and thinks it was fairly good adventure for a youngster, though a few weeks after his arrival in the Congo, when overtaken by fever, he couldn't hand the proposition quite so touch.

Tugman signed up for three years and stuck it out. But he never went back. Instead, he took the knowledge of Portuguese he absorbed through education in south Portugal and Spain to Brazil where he remained in the interior for fourteen years.

He came to Washington seven years ago and has been engaged in teaching languages since.

Tugman can spin interesting yarns of Stanley and Livingstone which he picked up in his youth, and has kept fresh in his mind through occasional telling. He was not in the Congo with either of these great men, but he associated with many who had served with them.

Add to Washington's list of only survivors.
