

RADIO EXPERT DESCRIBES BELL COMPANY PLANT

New Broadcasting Station to Be Marvel of Wide Possibilities.

By Cosmopolitan News Service. NEW YORK, April 6.—For the information of amateur radio operators throughout the country, Cosmopolitan News Service had obtained a technical description of the great new Bell telephone system broadcasting plant, which will be opened in a fortnight as the first out and out technical experiment in use of radio telephony.

Technical details are here given by the man who designed the plant: By W. R. KEING, Radio Expert for the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Describes Details. The antenna is of the TT type with a 200-foot span, and is supported on towers 100 feet high.

Have Wide Scope. The microphone transmitter and the intermediate amplifier which is used to magnify the currents coming from it to a value suitable to operate the modulator of the radio system are of the type used in connection with the public address system which has been developed by the Bell system engineers.
