U. S. PLANS TO REGULATE ALL RADIO TRAFFIC

Congressman White of Maine
To Offer Bill Embodiment
Expert Opinion.

Federal regulation of all radio communication as approved by Secretary of Commerce Hoover is provided in a bill being framed by Congressman White of Maine for introduction in the House next week, it was announced today. The legislation has been in the making for nearly two years. After the preliminary draft of the bill was completed by White, he submitted it to the Department of Commerce, where many changes were made by Government radio experts. The remarkable growth and development of wireless communication during the past two years has been made Federal regulation of radio a public necessity, White said today. He stated that his bill was intended to strengthen and perfect the law of 1912, pointing out that more than a million individual amateur radio outfits have been sold in the United States. The legislation is to give the Government control over wireless communication for the protection of the Government's own radio operations by licensing commercial concerns and amateurs who are experimenting with radio developments. The bill will provide regulations as to wave lengths and the power of the sets which various groups of operators will be permitted to use.
License boards and examining officials will be designated to take charge of the enforcement of the proposed regulations and it is stated that the Government control planned will encourage, instead of hinder, the development of radio communication and will enable the Government and commercial concerns to lessen their message without interference from amateurs and experimenters.
