



NAVY COACHES PUSH WORK ON SUB BACKFIELD

Middle Haves Numerous Sturdy Lads to Keep Up Stiff Pace Throughout Game.

By HUGH R. RILEY. ANNAPOLIS, Sept. 30.—Dob Felwell and his assistant coaches at the Naval Academy have progressed rapidly with the work of developing relay backfield as an important feature of the teams of recent years.

It is the policy at the Academy to make frequent changes in its backfield and to use substitutes. This is a rather light, but well-trained and experienced combination. All but McKee were regular backs last year, and McKee won his varsity letter in 1920, giving place to Barchet in season when the latter developed into such a brilliant runner.

Strong on Defense. Harilton, weighing 163 pounds, has been on the team for two seasons. While not a great carrier of the ball, he is a great assistance to the other runners, and a notable defensive player. McKee, weighing 153 pounds, is a good all-round back and a fair runner. Conroy is, next to Barchet, the best runner in the combination. He weighs 165 and is very fast and rugged. Barchet, weighing 162 pounds, is very solid and strong, and developed last year into one of the best of the college backs.

The second-string backfield is made up of Conroy, weighing 170, O'Regan, 178, and Norris, 154. It is a set of line-breakers, with a good runner in the person of Norris. Norris, in fact, is the closest understudy of Barchet, and would take his place if the latter dropped out. He is still young, but has great possibilities. He is a faster, but not so rugged, player than Barchet, and has done some fine work when given a chance in relay games.

Cullen is regarded as having a fine chance of displacing McKee as the first choice in the varsity backfield. He is a very powerful youth, with considerable speed and a kick which would make him a useful man in the backfield, the first combination being weak in this line.

Devens a Hard Worker. Devens was a hard working second-string player last year and his slashing work against the varsity toward the latter part of the season convinced the coaches that he would be a valuable relay player this year. O'Regan has speed and experience, as well as weight and strength, and is a valuable element in the wearing down process to which the Navy subjects its opponents.

A third backfield combination is made up of Sommers, 174; Rooney, 160; E. B. Taylor, 176, and Hughes, 145. This is a very fast combination, and not lacking in experience. Rooney and Hughes have been varsity substitutes for two seasons, both playing fast, aggressive games when called upon. Taylor, a rugged and determined youth, has great possibilities, while Sommers, who just entered this year, has made a reputation as a pre school back in Philadelphia. He is an even-time man for the hundred yards, and both weight and stamina should be a valuable back in time.

Fourth Combination. The fourth aggregation is composed of Lewis, 151; Soucek, 164; Belinger, 168, and Shapley, 172. Though three sets of backs remove this combination from the first selection, many college elevens would be pleased to have such an efficient quartet behind its line. Soucek, Belinger and Lewis will be worthy members of the squad when the varsity combination has its name in the most promising of the football candidates yielded by the new class. He runs the hundred close to ten seconds and appears to have natural ability as a runner. The Navy contingent looks to him to prove of immediate value and to be one of the best of the Navy backs in another season.

These four combinations by no means exhaust the backfield material, and good men are constantly developing on the second and class teams. As they show sufficient ability they will be transferred to the varsity.

The relay backfield has been one of the main factors contributing to the success of Naval Academy football teams in recent years, and the material necessary to keep it up is more abundant than ever before.

Start Drive on Nov. 4 For Minnesota Bowl

Minnesota's drive for its proposed \$2,000,000 stadium will be launched on November 4 when the Minnesota team appears on Northrop Field for its annual football game with the Maroon and Gold. At least \$200,000 is expected to be raised through average contributions of \$50 from faculty members and students. In addition to the students, faculty and alumni of the Maroon and Gold, campus organizations are to be asked to contribute their share.

The general procedure of the drive will probably resemble that conducted at the University of Illinois last fall, when, in a huge mass-meeting the students pledged \$750,000 in twenty minutes. Each subscriber at Illinois was given a ten-year pass to all athletic contests and each campus organization had its name inscribed on a brass plate on one of the exterior columns of the stadium. The Minnesota stadium is to be oval-shaped with one end open, resembling a horseshoe. It will be built around the present Northrop Field and will be a dual memorial to the Minnesota men who died in the service and to the late President Emeritus Cyrus Northrop.

Striking Caddies Will Picket Course

CUMBERLAND, Md., Sept. 30.—The caddies at the Cumberland Country Club struck for higher pay, but their grievance was probably settled once and for all when they were told by the officials of the club to return to their homes and not enter the club grounds again.

The boys, who had been receiving 35 cents for a round of nine holes, posted notices on the grounds that their fees would be raised to 50 cents. Some of the more liberal golfers had been paying 50 cents and 75 cents to the alert caddies. The striking caddies say they will establish a picket line at Lindernville and will endeavor to persuade other caddies from offering their services unless the fee is raised to 50 cents.

SCHEDULE FOR 1924 OLYMPIC IS COMPLETED

Initial Contests Consisting of Winter Sports Will Start in French Alps on January 28.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The completed program for the 1924 Olympic games, to be held in Paris, as announced here yesterday indicates that the international sports competition will extend, with a few breaks, over a period of more than four months. The initial contests will begin on January 28 with the winter sports program, being staged probably at Chamonix in the French Alps.

The final Saturday of July will witness the closing of the last event when the weight lifters will complete their competition at Paris. The programme follows: Sunday, January 28, to Tuesday, February 5.—Winter sports, including ice hockey, speed skating, figure skating for men and women; skiing races and jumping; also military events which will probably be held in Chamonix in the French Alps.

Saturday, May 3, to Sunday, May 13.—Rugby football. Thursday, May 15, to Monday, June 5.—Association football. Saturday, June 21, to Sunday, June 29, excepting Monday, June 23.—Rifle, pistol and trap shooting, which probably be held at Versailles, about eight miles from Paris.

Sunday, July 23, to Tuesday, July 8 (except Thursday, July 3, and Saturday, July 5)—Fencing (sabre, foils and sword). Sunday, June 29, to Friday, July 4 (except Thursday, July 3)—Horse polo. Cardinals Decide All Three Giant Pennants

The New York Giants won their tenth National League pennant and their eighth pennant for Manager McGraw by clinching this year's pennant with a victory over the Cardinals on September 25. An odd feature is that the Giants clinched their last three pennants by winning over the Cardinals. This was in 1917, last year and the present season.

The Giants clinched their first pennant on October 4, 1888, when Ed Crane defeated John K. Tener, pitching for Chicago, by a count of one to nothing. It was the sixth year of league membership for the Giants.

The Giants copped again the following year. It was fifteen years later, 1904, that the Giants returned victor. This was McGraw's first flag and the team repeated the next year, 1905, when Matty buried them into a world's championship.

The Giants' next win was in 1911, then in 1917, come the pennants of 1912, 1913, 1917, 1921 and this season.

BUNTING WINS FEATURE RACE AT THE "GRAW"

Whitney Horse, Nedna, Also Second, While Bluffer is Third in Big Md. Handicap.

HAVRE DE GRACE RACE TRACK, Md., Sept. 30.—Harry Payne Whitney's scintillating three-year-old colt, Bunting, top-topped his opposition in the eleventh renewal of the Havre de Grace handicap, the outstanding feature of the Hartford county course's closing-day program. Going to the post at the almost prohibitive odds of 35 to 100, the son of Pennant—Frillery rewarded his backers by scoring with comparative ease.

In accounting for the \$10,000 stake in the manner in which he did, Bunting went a long way to ward clinching the championship crown of the three-year-old division for 1922. Picking up 120 pounds, the Whitney star was asked to concede lumps of weight to the other seven contestants. That he can carry loadage and carry it with little or no effort over a distance of ground, was conclusively demonstrated in his race of today. Cutting out the field, Bunting, striking out his own pace from the race, made every post a winning one.

Jockey Rides Well. Bunting's impressive score was in a large measure due to the admirable ride given him by jockey Frank Keogh. Keogh timed his charge at the post in a manner that, once the half-mile post was reached, failed to leave the issue in doubt. At the first turn Bunting was clear of the field and racing full length out in front, with Nedna, a close challenger, lapped on his side. J. S. Coden's Blazes was the closest in pursuit of the Whitney pair as they straightened out on the jack stretch. The relative positions of the three year-olds and upward, one mile and one-sixteenth, were: Bunting, 35 to 100; Nedna, 10 to 1; Bluffer, 10 to 1; Trumper, 10 to 1; Blazer, 10 to 1; Loushael, 10 to 1; Minute Man, 10 to 1; Duc de Morny, 10 to 1; Sundial, 10 to 1; Mourouy, 10 to 1; May Blossom, 10 to 1; Overweight—Travalyan, 2 pounds, when called upon. At the top of the stretch Keogh was seen to raise his arm in the air. His intentions were never followed out. Bunting sensing what his ride was about to ask responded with a sound that was apparent to all. From then on the race lost all semblance of a contest. Bunting was running easily and Keogh found it unnecessary to urge him. Nedna was doing all that had been expected of her. She had tenaciously hung on to the grueling pace which her stable companion had cut out. She was in position at all times to go to the lead by defeating her. As they flashed under the wire Bunting was still four lengths out in front while Nedna held a margin of a length and one half over the fast closing Bluffer. The others were outclassed.
