

PROBE DEATH OF GREAT HAVEN MAN

J. J. Nicholas Said to Have Received Broken Neck Under Mysterious Circumstances.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Nov. 23.—The prosecuting attorney has been asked to investigate the death of J. J. Nicholas, of near Chat Haven, who died in the city hospital here on November 2, from a broken neck. It was claimed that when the man was brought to the institution that he had been hurt when he fell from a porch and that through the fact that he had been

drinking it was thought that he was only drunk and not injured. Later when a doctor examined him it was discovered that he had a broken neck. It was declared that the broken neck was not an accident. According to the statement told to the prosecuting attorney, Nicholas was given "doped" liquor and then assaulted by Dr. Hunger, of Point Marion, who attended the man in absent from the city and could not be located. An investigation will be made according to Prosecuting Attorney R. P. Posten.



CIRCUIT COURT AT EASTON HAS BIG DOCKET

Chief Judge Adkins and Associate Judges Wickes and Keating on Bench.

EASTON, Md., Nov. 23.—The November term of the circuit court for Talbot county convened with Chief Judge William H. Adkins and Associate Judges Lewin W. Wickes and Thomas J. Keating, on the bench. The court docket was called over and showed 67 civil trials, 27 civil appearances and 2 civil appeals. There are fourteen prisoners in the Easton jail awaiting trial on various charges.

The court named Capt. Thomas M. Cooper, foreman of the grand jury.

Judge Adkins in his charge to them called their attention to the corrupt practices act and the local prohibition law for Talbot county. He emphasized the fact that the local option law for Talbot county had in no way been affected by the national prohibition law, but was in full force. The judge expressed the opinion that if the law was not as well enforced as formerly, it was due to willful neglect of duty on the part of public officials who are unfaithful of their office. The court held memorial services in memory of the late Judge Philemon R. Topper, who recently died. High tribute of praise was spoken of Judge Hopper as a jurist and lawyer by the members of the court and members of the bar. The following comprise the grand and petit juries.


