LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

MATTERS IN BRIEF.—A new open front has been put in the room formerly occupied by the First National Bank, preparatory to fitting it up for a store-room.

Mr. Thomas Licklider has purchased the Ruckle farm, near Kearneysville, containing 85 acres, for \$3,000.

The Ground Hog had ample opportunity to "see his shadow" on the 2d, and a late spring, we suppose, is thus forecasted.

We understand Mr. Barney Lloyd has purchased the house and lot of Mr. Wm. Fitzpatrick, on Congress st., for \$600.

The Shenandoah Valley Agricultural Society, of Winchester, Va., will hold its next Fair on the 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th of October, 1879.

The ash-house of Mr. Benjamin Tomlinson was discovered to be on fire at an early hour Friday morning, but in time to prevent serious consequences.

Mr. J. C. Holmes has broken ground for the foundation of the dwelling which he will erect for his sisters, on the lot recently purchased of Wm. L. Wilson, Esq.

The Berkeley County Agricultural Society will hold its next Fair October 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th. The Jefferson Directors in the Society are H. B. Davenport, R. W. Baylor, J. E. Schley, Dr. I. S. Towner, D. Getzsdanner, Wm. A. Marshall.

Mr. A. B. Magruder, of Winchester, Va., has instituted suit against that city claiming \$800 for damages received by falling off a bridge crossing one of the streets.

We would not be surprised if Charlestown should have a suit of this character before long.

The new dwelling of Mr. James W. Butt is steadily approaching completion, and promises to be handsome, as well as comfortable and convenient.

Messrs. Davis & Harrell are putting on the tin roofing, and John N. Whittington beautifying it with paint. A stylish porch has been erected in front.

Jefferson County Building Association, No. 4, was organized on Friday last, and the following Directors elected: John T. Colston, H. H. Cooke, Joseph Trapnell, S. S. Dalgar, John E. Hilbert, W. H. Travers and Eugene Baker.

The new Association starts off with a goodly number of shares, and every prospect of success.

Lizzie, a little colored girl, aged about nine years, daughter of Henry Williams, came to a very sudden death on Tuesday afternoon last.

She was in an adjoining house when her mother called her, and starting to run to her she was taken with a hemorrhage and died before medical assistance could be summoned.

Fifteen chickens were stolen from the premises of C. H. McKnight, on Thursday night last—this in addition to ten taken from him in the same way during the holidays.


