The Treasury Report—No More Borrowing. In our brief review of Mr. McCulloch's report, says the New York Times, we assumed that he would not want as much as one hundred and twelve millions to make good his budget from the 1st of October last to the 30th of June next, and that he would receive more than one hundred and eleven millions in taxes, customs, &c., in excess of his budget for the next fiscal year, 1866. These errors of the Secretary, or errors which should have been corrected, we believe they will, are, of course, on the safe side—on the side of prudence and precaution, so far as the treasury or unexpected contingencies of the next eight months are taken into the account. But we have historical reasons to believe, and we state them in justice to the constantly improving finances of the government, that the first estimate, referred to above, of the receipts and expenditures of the last nine months of the current fiscal year, observes extreme and unnecessary caution, and that sequel will prove that no further borrowing to the increase of the total of the national debt will occur within these nine months.

Two months of the nine have already elapsed. The debt on the first of October was \$1,400,000, after deducting the cash balance—\$88,977,000—in the Treasury. On the first of December it stood at \$1,400,000, after deducting \$91,811,000 cash balance, and \$88,977,000 in the Treasury. Here is an actual reduction of \$12,000,000. To place the debt, therefore, at \$1,400,000 on the 1st of June next, by the addition of \$12,000,000, as estimated, would imply a deficit of \$12,000,000 in the income of the remaining seven months, which cannot be deemed as probable.

The Customs are estimated for the nine months at only \$108,000,000. For October and November they were \$30,000,000, and for December \$38,000,000. These are two of the dull months of the year, according to the ordinary run of the question, the rate of only \$10,000,000 per month in place of \$100,000,000. The present rate of \$10,000,000, or \$15,000,000, should be added to the \$30,000,000 estimated for miscellaneous receipts.

The Internal revenues of the same period are estimated at only \$175,000,000. We do not compute the number of deaths in the Civil armies since the commencement of the war at 350,000, and of the Southern soldiers that have been lost, a part of the costly price paid for the defense of the nation's life. At Gettysburg, 23,000 Union soldiers were killed, wounded or taken prisoners—our greatest loss during one campaign. Gen. Grant's losses, from the time he crossed the Rappahannock until Lee's surrender, were about 90,000. Grant, as we are told, never lost a man, and he was not killed in European wars, owing to our superior medical and sanitary arrangements, and the care of the Government for its troops.

Mr. WASHINGTON, of Illinois, has introduced in Congress to revise the grade of General and to authorize the President to appoint a General "to be selected from among the officers in the military service of the United States, most distinguished for courage, skill and ability, who, being commissioned as General, may be authorized, under the direction and during the pleasure of the President, to command the armies of the United States." The pay is to be one-half greater than that received by the Lieutenant General; his aids are to be cavalry, and when the office becomes vacant, the act creating it is to be no longer in force.
