This course induces an active demand for money from the West; but, at the same time, the pressure to realize causes caution among discounters of produce paper, who naturally say that the large supplies must precipitate a heavy fall in prices. Much must depend upon-the celerity with which the crops are distributed.

If a large amount of grain should be exported early, or should the purchases for consumption be liberal, the money advanced upon the early receipts will be soon released and again thrown upon the market. But whether such a result may be anticipated, in the event of a declining market for produce, is questionable.
