DIVIDENDS.—The Savings Institution and the Citizens' Insurance Company announce their semi-annual dividends in this morning's paper.

LITERARY SOCIETY.—A meeting of the young gentlemen of South Wheeling will be held in the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association located in that portion of the city, on Saturday evening next, for the purpose of organizing a literary society.

PITTABLE.—A drunken woman was parading the streets of East Wheeling, yesterday, much to the annoyance of good citizens, and to the merriment of the juvenile portion of the population. Her language and conduct were of the basest description. Cannot something be done to stop such exhibitions on our streets?

BURNED.—A boy had his face pretty badly burned on New Year's day, by the premature discharge of a pistol with which he was celebrating the day. The accident happened near the site of the Zinc bridge. This practice of firing pistols in the streets on holidays is a dangerous one, and the ordinance forbidding it should be enforced.

FRIGHT.—An eyewitness informed us yesterday, that a disagreeable fight came off in North Wheeling, in which the celebrated "Barry" Vance was one of the parties. Both of our bluffing heroes were dressed in their best, except their pantaloons, and were out on a public street taking a regular set in the midst of the mud and snow. No arrests were made that we heard of.

ENTERTAINMENT.—We were told yesterday, that the Benwood Nail Works are to be enlarged, and that the work has already been commenced. A building 180 feet long, and of proportional width, is well advanced toward completion, and will be ready for occupancy by the 1st of April or May. We learned, also, that when the new row begins, it is designed to be of similar size will be commenced.

BELLARE WORKS.—Steam was raised under the boilers of this new enterprise, a few days since, and we are told that the machinery worked remarkably well. ARRREST.—Benjamin Hazard, as we are informed, dashed a term in jail on Monday or Tuesday. Yesterday, if our information is correct, he laid the foundation for another job of boarding out a fine at the expense of the public, and when under the influence, is disposed to be cross to his family; at least we were told that he abused his wife shamefully, cutting a terrible, and saying that all the world was against him. He was promptly arrested, and will, perhaps, have a hearing this morning.

He was found some distance during the night, and all further attempts to ascertain his whereabouts were unsuccessful, until morning, when, after dragging the creek about a short time his body was drawn to the surface. E. R. Bulger being informed of the circumstance, immediately summoned a coroner's jury. Several witnesses were examined and the foregoing facts elicited. A verdict of accidental drowning was rendered.

Dally is represented to have been a sober and industrious man. He had been a resident of this city for many years, and was highly respected by all who knew him. He was interred, yesterday, in the Oak Grove cemetery.

FATAL STOVE.—Several mornings since we made mention of the fact that quite a number of wagons and carriages had recently been broken at the west end of the Suspension Bridge. CHILD BURNED.—A little daughter of Michael Burn, aged five years, was burned, early on Wednesday morning, so that she did not have a day to live. She nearly all her clothing was burned off before she reached her. Medical assistance was at once called in, but the injuries were so severe that it was but a human power to save her life. The little sufferer lingered in great agony until 12 o'clock when death came to her relief. The child was a favorite of her parents, and the blow to its afflicted parents is a severe one.
