

THE SENATE SIT AGAIN TO-DAY as a Court for the trial of the impeachment of the President, and the proceedings will commence with the opening argument for the defence by Judge Curtis; after which the defence will present their evidence. The cross-examination will be by Mr. Bingham. The President's counsel express the opinion that they can get in all their evidence, documentary and oral, in three days, but it is safe to allow them a week. The managers do not expect to object to much of their evidence, so that little time will be occupied in discussing interlocutory questions. Butler, however, is so much inclined to pugnacity, that he can't keep out of controversy. It has been arranged that Messrs. Evans and Stantbery will make the closing arguments for the defence.

The managers are busily engaged in the case, and at a recent meeting decided that the concluding arguments for the prosecution should be made by Messrs. Bingham and Boutwell, both of whom are now engaged in preparing the same. The state of Mr. Stevens' health obliged him to relinquish the idea of making an argument on his article, as he had originally intended. It is reported that the managers in answer to the point made by the defence that the case of Secretary Stanton does not come within the terms of the tenure-of-office act, will present a letter of President Johnson to the officers of the Lincoln Cabinet requesting and authorizing them to continue in charge of their respective departments.

There is a prospect that the trial will close with the month. The defence of the President will consist mostly in attacking Johnson's conduct, and in showing that the tenure-of-office act had the right to remove Stanton, and further that the case of Secretary Stanton does not come within the terms of the tenure-of-office act, will present a letter of President Johnson to the officers of the Lincoln Cabinet requesting and authorizing them to continue in charge of their respective departments.

The official returns show that English, the Democratic candidate for Governor, is re-elected by a majority of 1,731. Last year his majority was 957. Both branches are largely Republican. This secures a Republican Senator as successor to Mr. Dixon, whose term expires next March. This is a substantial result which the Republicans can afford to be satisfied with. It shows furthermore, that Connecticut is not in fact a Democratic State in the Copperhead sense, although she elects a Democratic Governor. English is a man of great personal popularity, a war Democrat, a man who as a member of Congress supported the war policy of the Government, and who besides, in this contest, had the Federal and State party at his command.
