WEST VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE

REGULAR SESSION.

THURSDAY, Feb. 4, 1869.

Prayer by Rev. D. W. Fisher.

The following bills were reported

from Committees, and read the first

time, and re-adopted section 11, of

chapter 15, of the Code of West Vir-

ginia.

To amend and re-adopt the charter of

the town of New Martinsville, in West-

Virginia.

To prevent the destruction of small

game.

To relieve J. B. Solomon, of Taylor

county, from taking the teachers' test

oath.

Mr. Hoke, from the Judiciary, re-

ported a substitute for the bill offered

by Mr. Chapline, on yesterday, entitled

"A bill legalizing the acknowledgment

and recording of mortgages in Jefferson

county, in 1867." The substitute was

passed.

Mr. Phelps introduced a bill to re-

peal the act passed February 23, 1867,

providing for the improvement of the

navigation of the Great Kanawha River.

The bill passed.

Mr. Chapman presented the pay roll

of the Capt. Thomas Godfrey of the 190th

Regiment Va. militia. Referred to the

Committee on Finance.

The reports made by the Judiciary

Committee on yesterday, that it was

inexpedient to legislate on the report

of the Judiciary, were adopted.

The hour of 11 o'clock having arrived,
