PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—We are informed that on Friday last, a little daughter of Nelson Campbell, who lives near Newburg, in this county, met with a frightful accident by which she is crippled for the remainder of her life.

It is reported that the child, who is but six years of age, was playing in the yard with her brother, who is one year her senior, and by chance they found an ax lying in the yard which they commenced to amuse themselves; the little girl selected a stick and held it on the ground, while the brother used the ax in cutting little bits off the end, and in making a stroke the ax glanced and struck the child's wrist, severing the hand at the wrist joint.

Dr. F. A. Rymer, of Mannington, was called, and after the wound was dressed the little girl was restored easier, and in a few counts was doing well. This is certainly a sad and unfortunate affair.

FAIRMONT WEST VIRGINIA.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.—On Saturday last, two men hired a team from a livery stable in Fairview, for the purpose of going to the county seat to procure a marriage license.

One of the men, who was named John, being a married man, was given to them. After getting out of town they stopped and gathered a lot of firewood, and then proceeded on their way.

They drove the team to and from Cambridge in this way. When they returned to the livery stable, the driver, who was named John, was found dead in the stable.

EUROPE.

Retirement of Hon. Reverdy Johnson. LONDON, May 13.

Hon. Reverdy Johnson to-day, sent a dispatch to Washington informing the Secretary of State of his former withdrawal from the office of Minister to England.

After giving in some detail an account of his friendly farewell reception by the Queen, Mr. Johnson says this terminates the mission, "which has been conducted on my part with zeal and fidelity, which has fulfilled to the letter the instructions of my Government, and which has aimed to protect the rights, preserve the honor and promote the interests of my country."
