The special correspondent of the Tribune at Berlin, telegraphs this day the following letter from Bismarck concerning the means and conditions of peace.

MEATS, Friday, Sept. 16, 1870. Your Excellency is familiar with the circular which M. Jules Favre has addressed to the foreign representatives of France in the name of the man at present holding power in Paris and who call themselves "Le Gouvernement de la Defense Nationale."

It is impossible to say what will be the effect of their obtaining control of the government, but the people dread pillage and assassination.

The Ministry has issued a proclamation to the people stating that "France will rather buy herself in her own ruins than accept the insolent conditions of Germany."

The postal service is more irregular than ever. General Canrobert has been appointed to command the army of Bourges.

New Peace Rumors. The rumors of new developments in the negotiations for peace are confirmed.

French Defects Denied. The constitutional says: "It was erroneously reported yesterday that the negotiations around Paris resulted in French reverses."

The Paris Fortifications Improved. Improvements have been made in the fortifications of Paris under the direction of the American General Ripley.

Affairs at Strasbourg. The same journal says: "We have positive knowledge that, notwithstanding the incessant bombardment of Strasbourg, there was a weak space between the walls."
