Schenck's District—A Close Contest. From the Dayton Journal of yesterday. The result in Montgomery county is about this: The Republican State ticket is defeated by about 400 majority. A LETTER IN THE NEW YORK SAN SAYS A FOREIGN DIPLOMAT HERE, IN PRIVATE ventilates the opinion that King William and Bismarck are beyond all peradventure working for the re-establishment of the Empire under Napoleon IV., with the regency of Eugenie and consent of Napoleon III. This conviction, which many of his conferees entertain, he says, did not receive the confirmation received by the re-issuance of Bourbaki into Metz.

So it was that a great debt was laid upon the industry, the capital and the production of the country. It is safe to say that the disloyal course of the Democratic organization, in which happily it failed to carry all of its party, newly doubled the cost of the war. And consistently with its practice in the war, the Democratic party opposed every measure of reconstruction founded on the principles of justice and equality, with adequate guarantees for its stability, and voted against the taxes that were necessary to carry on the government, and to pay the interest on the debt which it had done so much to create.

There is some reason in the assertion that our system of directing letters is wrong, and that we ought to reverse the order, putting the State first, as this is the first item to be looked at, then the city, then the street, and finally the name of the person it is written to. This, it is said, classifies the direction in the order in which the postoffice attends to it; but if the clerks were asked about it they would probably say that a matter of greater importance is that people should direct boldly and plainly, and put the stamp on the right-hand corner.

"Compliments of Lewis Baker."

To the Wheeling Intelligencer. Some weeks ago the Wheeling Register came to a Union Republican soldier in Brooke county, West Virginia, containing a separate card on which was the inscription, viz: "Compliments of LEWIS BAKER."

And also editorial expressions such as, "Fasten the reins which bind and debase the thousands of the true and best citizens of the State." "All possible resistance." "Obedience is simply impossible." "Resistance will follow." "I will not proclaim in advance," &c., and many such.

Now, sir, the soldier to whom these presents and compliments were sent had never mastered in a rebel company, and therefore could not appreciate that those "thousands" who disfranchised themselves by their rebellion, or sympathy for it, were the "truest and best citizens;" nor would lend his influence to the "resistance" of the government, which in his defence he had been wounded, or better, that "obedience is impossible," or that "resistance" is the duty of good citizens.

The editor of the Register, and candidate for the Senate, should be more guarded in the future as to whom he sends his electrifying documents and special compliments, as many an earnest man highly by whom he participated actively or sympathized freely in and for the "lost cause."

It is thought by some that sending any thing without a newspaper to post office is an infringement of postal laws. Be this as it may, if a Republican would send them highly by whom he participated actively or sympathized freely in and for the "lost cause," it would be unconstitutional in the estimation of all who hated Abraham Lincoln.

Business men in Europe begin to calculate the commercial results of the war. In England, and here in the United States, there has been a certain revival in the iron trade, consequent upon the closing of more than one of the principal continental manufacturing establishments; but ere long many English people will have to make up their minds to do without many articles which hitherto they have had no difficulty in getting. Even in Germany no indemnity that can be exacted will prevent people from being poorer than before. Large bodies of men have been suddenly transmuted from producers into consumers, and many have been incapacitated from being anything but consumers for the remainder of their natural lives.

Who shall describe the condition of France? The resources of the country were first crippled by the drought, and then when it came the war, which put a stop to all work, and utterly ruined a fifth of the departments, and has prepared for the winter a heart-rending amount of distress. In Paris alone more than a million of people who depended on their wages have been more than six weeks without employment, and then there are the 900,000 people of the suburbs outside the fortifications, who were all compelled to leave their homes, and who have no means of supporting themselves.

Somebody in Madison, Ga., has been interviewing Robert Toombs, and sending the result to the Rochester Union. "Toombs said Lincoln was a good but not a great man; Attorney General Akerman was well enough—a hard-working, good sound lawyer; Grant and Sherman will be the next candidates for President; that the national debt will never be paid, but will be reduced until it reaches a par value in gold; that there will be no other conflict between North and South in our generation, for in a few years the "Yanks" will own nearly all the Southern lands, and that they don't get the "triggers" will, that the Southerners will go to the Southwest and use up more lands for the grandchildren of Northern men to redeem. When asked:

"But what will you do for labor, General, to wear out those rich fields?" He said: "China and Japan will furnish it." "But the Democratic party of the North are opposed to introducing this kind of labor, and will make it a party issue perhaps?" "They had better let that question alone," said he. "The law of supply and demand will govern it in spite of parties, and the fewer issues a party has to pack, the easier can it march to victory."

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Grant and the Missouri Office-Holders

The correspondent of the New York Post writes that President Grant is reported to be much annoyed at the criticisms in the Republican newspapers on his removal of office-holders in Missouri who do not support the Republican ticket. He asserts that his position is not correctly understood. In making the removals he kept in view only the fact that the offices were held by men who were giving their support to a ticket not selected by the Republican convention, and did not take into consideration whether they were revenue reformers or protectionists. This statement is made at the request of a member of the cabinet, who thinks injustice has been done upon the President.

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
