THE LEGISLATURE. The Legislature will assemble at the new Capitol to-day. Navigation is now open, though most of the members from the northern and eastern part of the State, not anticipating a thaw, started several days ahead of time, and made the trip overland.

DEMOCRATIC REPUTATION. The course of the INTELLIGENCER in reference to the public debt is a singularly disingenuous one. It publishes every scrap of complaint against the payment by West Virginia of any portion of the debt, which it can find, without knowing whether it emanates from Democratic or Radical sources, and styles it "Democratic Repudiation."
