EUROPE. THE WAR.

German Batteries at Paris Advanced. Versailles, January 18. The batteries southwest of Paris have advanced to within 800 yards of Fort Montreux, which replied yesterday with one gun on the west front only.

Damage and Suffering in the City. Accounts from Paris represent a terrible state of damage and suffering caused by the bombardment. Shells have fallen within St. Louis En Lisle.

Bad French Gunners. There have been no sorties for the last thirty-six hours. The French outside works are being reinforced.

Large Fires in Paris. Versailles, Jan. 20. Last night the Germans pushed forward a patrol into the trenches of the communication between Fort Issy and Forts without meeting resistance.

Rumored Revolt in Paris. A rumor is in circulation here that a terrible revolt has broken out in Paris, assuming the form of a revolution.

Reports from Paris by Balloon. A balloon has landed in Belgium with advices from Paris to the 18th inst.

Seize of Longwy. A dispatch from Arlon says the bombardment of Longwy by the Prussians continued vigorously to-day.

Paris, Jan. 20, 2 a. m. General Foy (General) telegraphs to Garibaldi that his vanguard is in pursuit of the retreating army.

WASHINGTON.
