The Latest News. FROM THE CAPITAL.

Inaugural Address of Gov. Jacob. A Moderate, Sensible and Dignified Speech-He Approves the Flick Amendment and Counsels Good Feeling, Economy and Light Taxation.

Disorderly Conduct of the Citizens.

PARKEENBURG, March 5. The inauguration of Governor Jacob took place at Charleston, yesterday noon, at the front steps of the capitol, in presence of about three hundred persons.

By the Constitution and laws of the State, I am charged with the performance of duties which more or less affect the interests and well-being of all the people.

CLOSING HOURS OF THE OLD CONGRESS—OPENING OF THE NEW. WASHINGTON, March 4. Pending the question upon the passage of the repeal of the duties on coal, which was debated until a few minutes to 3 o'clock this morning, the Senate held an executive session at 10:30 a. m.

XLII Congress. THIRD SESSION. SENATE. WASHINGTON, March 3.

[Balance of Friday Night's Report.] The Senate still considering the Omnibus Appropriation bill, Mr. FRETTON moved an appropriation of \$99,000 for the light house, etc., at Fair Haven, New York.

Mr. TOWNSEND offered an amendment looking to a reform in the civil service. It authorizes the President to prescribe regulations for the admission of persons into the civil service of the United States.

During the consideration of the bill the House substitute for the Senate bill, relating to fraudulent trade marks and for protecting American manufacturers of articles from fraudulent foreign imitations was introduced.

Mr. POMEROY moved an amendment to the sundry civil appropriation bill to repeal the duty on coal. Objection being made that it was an amendment of the nature of a bill raising the revenue it could not be received.

Mr. POMEROY then withdrew it, when Mr. TOWNSEND gave notice that as soon as the pending bill was disposed of, he would move to take up the House Joint Resolution on the subject.

At 2:15 a. m. the bill was passed. Mr. TOWNSEND then moved that the Senate proceed to the consideration of the House joint resolution repealing the duty on coal.

Mr. WARNER proceeded to read a lengthy written argument in favor of the payment of claims of loyal southerners, and a more conciliatory policy towards the southern people.

Mr. VICKERS said there were four species yet to be made on the bill, and it could not pass before the hour of adjournment.

XLIII Congress. FIRST SESSION. SENATE. WASHINGTON, March 4.

After pronouncing the Senate of the Forty-second Congress adjourned, the Vice President, without vacating his seat, continued: The time fixed for the assembling of the first session of the Forty-third Congress, according to law, having arrived, the Secretary will call the roll of the names of the Senators elect, who will present themselves in front of the Vice President's chair to take the oath of office.

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Mr. BINGHAM moved that the Mississippi representatives be sworn in, and their credentials referred to the Committee on Election; agreed to. Three of them taking the test oaths of 1865 and the modified oath of 1868.

EUROPE. FRANCE.

Evacuation of Paris. The German troops have all left Paris. The evacuation terminated at eleven o'clock, a. m., Friday, in accordance with the terms of the convention.

Not a German soldier remains in Paris. The Saxons passed at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, marching in front of the Arc de Triomphe, amid the profound silence of the few spectators, by noon the evacuation of the city was complete.

The German Emperor afterwards reviewed 100,000 men in the Bois de Boulogne. The Prussian leaders are disappointed at the coolness and impassive attitude of the Parisians.

The German forces have received orders to withdraw behind the line of the Seine. The statement that the Prussian Government is in favor of an honorable peace, may be, in process of an honorable, cordial and lasting adjustment.

GERMANY.

Berlin, March 5. The Emperor will return to Berlin in about eight days. Prince Frederick William has been appointed commander-in-chief of the army of occupation in France.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, March 3. In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Dickey gave notice of a resolution of regret that the Government had assented to holding the Black Sea Conference on the conditions declared by Prince Gortzchokoff.

FINANCES.

Precautions at London—Heavy Loss on Cotton. NEW YORK, March 3. The World's financial article notices that the Bank of England has advanced the rate of discount one-half per cent., and says the cotton markets are in a state of depression.

Calling in the 3 per cent Certificates. WASHINGTON, March 4. George Boutwell to-day directed the Assistant Treasurer at New York to notify the holders of three per cent certificates of March 2, 1867, and July 25th, 1868, that all such certificates bearing date from October 15th, 1867 to December, 1868, 1869, inclusive, of the denomination of five dollars each, looking for a month between numbers 759 and 1,070, will be paid on presentation at his office, and that from and after April 30th, 1871, such certificates will cease to bear interest and will no longer be available as a lawful revenue in the possession of any National Banking Association.
