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EUROPE. FRANCE. Battlefields Breeding Pestilence-- Affairs in Paris.

LONDON, March 13. A special from Lille to the News says the battlefields in the north of France threaten to become the focus of pestilence. Dead bodies are found floating in the dikes and marshes, and active measures are being taken for their interment. The Telegraph's special from Amiens says: The future German army of occupation in France will consist of the Saxon and Wurtemberg corps and the Seventh Prussian Corps. There is a rumor that Ricciotti Garibaldi is in Paris for a special at Paris telegraphs that the presence of numerous Garibaldians in Paris has a very disquieting influence upon the population.

PARIS, March 16. A Times special from Paris says that the French Cabinet has decided to appoint a Prefect of Paris. This indicates the adoption of measures for the suppression of all popular tumults. The police will, however, permit the usual mild lull gathering and disturbances are feared. An inflammatory journal, Le Peuple, appeared in Paris yesterday, and was once seized by the police. Councils of ministers are to be held at Versailles. The Prefecture receptions of foreign officers will hereafter be held at their residences in Paris.

ENGLAND. The Times on American Relations. LONDON, March 16. The Times in an editorial on the subject of the labor of the High Commission at Washington, anticipates an easy settlement of the fishery question, but is not so sanguine as to the arrangement in the case of the Alabama claims, and expresses regret at the limited power held by the Commission.

NEW YORK CITY. Civil suits against Captain Peabody of the ship Neptune are at present occupying the attention of the courts. The defendant's counsel produced a release signed by the plaintiffs which is alleged by them to be fraudulent. The cases are still on.

SAN DOMINGO. Latest News from the Commission-- The Commissioners at the Haytian Capital--Interview with President Saget--Arrangement to Meet Cabral.

SAMANA BAY, February 23, 1871. The United States steamer Nautaset has arrived here from Santo Domingo city, bringing news five days later than that brought by the Tybee on the 18th. Commissioners Andrew White left Santo Domingo city on an overland trip to Puerto Plata. At the latter place he will be taken on board the Nautaset and proceed to the Haytian capital, the capital of Hayti, where by previous arrangement he will have an interview with General Jose Cabral, the former President of the Dominicans and now leader of the forces opposed to Baez. Mr. White is accompanied by Samuel Hazard, Jr., of Philadelphia, and Mr. Buckwell, of Newark, N. J.

POINT A PRINCE, HAYTI, March 7. The Commissioners reached here on the 2d of March from Azua. They are all in excellent health, and will here for Prof. White, who went overland to Puerto Plata. He is expected in the Nautaset, which is bringing with it two scientific expeditions, and Prof. Professors Blake and Ward, that crossed before him. The Tennessee will then start immediately for home, touching at Santiago de Cuba and Key West for coal. The questions of debt and disputed boundary are the most important raised since the last dispatches. The Haytians are bitterly opposed to annexation. The Commissioners, however, were received civilly. Cabral's strength consists almost wholly of Haytian support.

HOUSE. There was an exciting scene in the House to-day just after the reading of the Journal, arising out of a letter addressed by Mr. Butler to his Republican colleagues on the floor of the House, explaining his reasons for not serving on the special committee to investigate Southern outrages. Judge KELLEY denied the truth of the letter, which charges that the high tariff men were united with the Democrats to pass the resolution. Mr. BUTLER said he did not in his letter refer to Mr. KELLEY, because he (Mr. KELLEY) had always stood with his party and attended caucus, and felt himself bound by caucus decision, but referred to other Republicans who were tariff men, and who had fought all bills intended to suppress the Ku Klux.

CALIFORNIA. Preparations to Receive President Grant--Comment on the New Hampshire Election. At a meeting of citizens held this afternoon arrangements were made to prepare a reception for President Grant on his proposed visit to California. Resolutions were adopted favoring him, and a committee of arrangements appointed. The ship Annie Small, from Hong Kong, has been libelled for smuggling opium to California.

THE INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION. WASHINGTON, March 16. Sessions of the Joint High Commission are held daily. There is fear prevailing in these quarters that the recent discussion has developed differences of opinion which may prevent a peaceful settlement. In reply to a question yesterday, one of the American Commissioners said in a significant manner that if the Commission were able to reach a satisfactory conclusion at all, it would terminate its labors by the middle of April. It is believed that the difficulty lies in the inability of the English Commissioners to meet the preliminary requirements for negotiations. It is so stated by the American Commissioners, as to the Alabama liabilities.

NEW JERSEY ELECTIONS. NEW YORK, March 16. The returns from the town elections throughout Burlington county, New Jersey, were nearly complete yesterday. A majority of Republican freeholders were elected. Burlington township gave a large Republican majority. In Middleville, Cumberland county, the Republicans made a clean sweep, electing their Mayor by 294 of a majority.

BOILER EXPLOSION. ASHLAND, Pa., March 16. A boiler in E. East's coal breaker exploded this morning, killing Mark Daniel, the engineer, and seriously, if not fatally, injuring several other persons.
