INDIANA.

Death of a Prominent Citizen. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 24. J. R. Osgood, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of this city, died last night. He was well known throughout the State as an efficient worker in the Sabbath School cause, and was for many years Superintendent of the school connected with the Baptist Church of this place.

James Brown, a young man 23 years of age, a resident of this place was drowned yesterday while bathing. The body was recovered and is being held in the Milligan case all day and it is probable the case will be concluded by to-morrow.

The last pier is now being built and will be completed at an early day, and the iron work will then be immediately placed in position.

Boose Leasure had no ball to carry, but he had. He deemed any one of the above sufficient, but as a whole they should clear any man from city service, and he would die then and there sooner than go. Toby didn't go on the chain gang yesterday, but he will get nothing to eat until he does."

ELECTION RETURNS. Proposition for Subscription Lost. Below we present the official returns of the election held last Saturday to take the sense of the people of Ohio county upon a proposition to subscribe \$150,000 to the Pittsburgh, Wheeling, & Kentucky Railroad. It will be seen that the whole number of votes cast was 2,308; of these 1,193 are in favor of subscription, 1,014 opposed, and one scattering. Three-fifths of all the votes cast would be 1,324.45. The proposition, therefore, lacks 131.45 of the required majority.
