THE ANTHRACITE REGION. The Funeral of the Victims of the Scranton Riot.

The Pittston Holocaust—Officials Squabbling over the Dead Bodies.

A special from Scranton says that great preparations are making for the funeral of the dead bodies of David Edwards, John Lloyd, Ben Jones and Geo. Cull which will be brought to this city for burial in the Cemetery at Hyde Park where several Avoudeunfortunates were buried.

The special from Pittston last night says the trains on the roads leading into this place from Wilkesbarre, Scranton and other places have brought hundreds of people, most of them visiting the locality of the late disaster, but out of mere curiosity. There is little to be seen here beyond the smoking ruins of the breaker and huge piles of coal on it. Nineteen are now dead. Among those conveyed to the Luzerne House are being taken from the mine. All have been removed to their homes. But four of those taken out alive have yet regained their senses, and though the physicians profess to have strong hopes that most of them will recover, the sufferers certainly look as though death even now holds them in its grasp.

Thos. Edwards and his son, aged 13 years, have both so far recovered as to be able to walk about. The Edwards' story of their trials in the mine is truly heartrending. Strong men unused to prayer, invoked Divine interference for safety. Hymns were sung and men kissed each other in agony of despair. The Coroner's inquest is not yet concluded, but it will go far toward censuring, and perhaps severely censuring both the officers of the company and the Mine Inspector, Mr. Williams, of Wilkesbarre. An animating scene transpired between the Coroner and the Inspector of Mines. The latter claimed the right to examine witnesses. The Coroner denied the right, but extended the privilege as a matter of courtesy. After some parleying and snubbing on each side, the Inspector arose and told the Coroner, "You are not competent to conduct this investigation, neither are the jurors fit men to arrive at a rational conclusion." The Coroner responded quickly, "Inspector, leave this room immediately," and he left. The affair throughout was disgraceful. There is a prominent deficiency in the investigation, the parties whose interests are at stake having no representatives. The W. B. A. had no counsel. The Inspector was denied a hearing save as a witness, and the operators had no show. After re-assembling in the afternoon the matter assumed a better shape, and the examination was conducted more decently, but profound ignorance as to the means of eliciting the testimony was evinced.

WASHINGTON. The New York Central Scrip Decision.

A Washington dispatch says that the decision of Commissioner Plessington in the New York Central Railroad scrip dividend case there creates great surprise, as the long delay and other circumstances had led many to suppose the decision would be adverse to the Government. General Plessington does not expect that the company will begin judicial proceedings to avoid the payment, but to prevent this he has eliminated from the question all the issues. One of the most important of the questions yet to be settled will be the claim of the Government for interest on the tax from the time it was due until it was paid. The decision does not settle this, but there is no doubt that the company will have to pay it.

MEETING OF STEAMBOAT INSPECTORS. WASHINGTON, May 30. The Secretary of the Treasury yesterday telegraphed to all supervising inspectors of steamboats to assemble in Washington on the 7th of June next, in order to organize under the provisions of the act to provide for the better security of life on board of vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam, and for other purposes.

HALL'S ARCTIC EXPEDITION. The President and Secretary of the Navy will visit the Navy Yard on Wednesday to thoroughly inspect the steamer Polar, now lying at the wharf, which has been fitted up for Captain Hall's forthcoming voyage to the Arctic regions.

MR. COLFAX'S CONDITION. Vice President Colfax is still improving and was able to walk about his room today. He is confident he will be able to start for his home in Indiana tomorrow.

Gen. James Watson Webb and family sail for Europe Wednesday.

The second trial of Congressman Bowen for bigamy in marrying Miss Susan P. King while his wife, Mrs. Frances Bowen was living, in Augusta, South Carolina, began today before Judge Olin, David Dudley Field appearing in the defense of Bowen. The records in New York divorcing Bowen in 1865 were presented by the defense, and of the New Haven Court, divorcing him in November last, by the prosecution, and Judge Olin, wishing to investigate the question of fraud, adjourned the case for further argument. A note prosequi was entered in the Parks-Bowen divorce case, heretofore tried.

Movements of Mr. Greeley. NEW ORLEANS, May 30. Horace Greeley leaves this afternoon by R. E. Lee for Vicksburg, thence by rail to Memphis, where he speaks Friday evening.

PARIS. A DESOLATE CITY. A NEW REIGN OF TERROR.

The Old System of Denunciations. NOBODY SAFE. The Bloody Code of the Conquerors.

A special correspondent of the Tribune at Paris, telegraphs Sunday evening: "Paris looks completely calmed. The shops are all closed, and even those of vital necessity, such as chemists, remain shut. Restaurants, bakeries and grocery stores, have also suspended business. I walked across Paris last night, and never saw anything so desolate. I saw no human beings but sentries every hundred yards, and one shabby civilian. There were no sounds but the footfall of the sentinels, and then only made when they struck their muskets on the flagstones. "The old revolutionary system of denunciations, is going on with terrible ferocity. Nador, the aronah, has been arrested for supposed sympathy with the Commune. Nobody is safe even in the presence of their most intimate friends. A rash word or impudent gesture by man or woman, insures instant death. Men, women, and even children, are seized by the brutal soldiery and shot. The saddest feature is the conduct of the women, female insurgents having in many instances been detected firing the houses of innocent persons with petroleum.

VERSAILLES, May 30. The inhabitants of Belleville have announced that they will make reprisals, and a secret system of arson and assassination is apprehended. There are constant discoveries of stores of petroleum in Paris. The insurgents from Fort Vincennes have surrendered unconditionally to the Versailles troops. The Gariboldi announces that the Orleans Princes will be allowed to live in France. Thiers has ordered the disarmament of the ports and the dissolution of the National Guards in the Department of the Seine. McMahon has issued a congratulatory proclamation to the army. Paris is tranquil, and trade already shows signs of reviving. The soldiers have been petted by the inhabitants. Arrests of insurgents continue. The insurgent losses previous to May 23d, when the Versailles troops entered Paris, are estimated at 120,000 killed and wounded and 25,000 prisoners, and since May 23d at ten thousand killed and wounded, and 20,000 prisoners. The prisoners have all been sent to Versailles. General La Cœuille, with a few followers, fled to the Castle of Vincennes, but upon the commencement of the erection of the siege works by the Versaillesists he at once surrendered.

General Doulay officially reports having lost forty officers and 600 men during the engagements in which his troops have participated since the Versailles army entered Paris.

The Paris journals demand the cessation of summary execution. Several attempts were made yesterday to assassinate officers of the army. The bodies of the murdered Priests are to lie in state for a week. With the exception of Puyat and Grousset, all the Commune chiefs have been killed or taken prisoners.

VERSAILLES, May 30. The Official Journal of the Republic announces that the arsenal and museum of Louvre are safe.

Order Relays in Warsaw. A proclamation from Marshal McMahon to the people of Paris announces their deliverance from the reign of terror of the Communists, and that order, security, and labor are about being reestablished.

INDIA. An Island Devastated by an Earthquake.

SINGAPORE, May 25. A volcanic eruption and earthquake has shaken the island of Rra. The country was terribly devastated, and four hundred lives were lost.

Victor Hugo Expelled from Belgium. BRUSSELS, May 30. In the Belgian Senate to-day, Baron D'Anthelien in reply to Mr. Hodcs, stated that the government having become convinced that the recent letter of Victor Hugo was compromising Belgium, has requested Hugo to leave the country, and upon his refusal to do so, the King signed a decree, the object of which forced his departure from the country. The Prime Minister added that the decree would be enforced.

LONDON, May 30. Victor Hugo having been driven out of Belgium is coming to London. The Daily News says the train for Paris will run to-morrow. The people of Brussels have smashed a window in Victor Hugo's house. The police now guard the house.

HARTFORD, CONN. Hartford, Ct., May 29. The Police Commissioner to-day suspended W. F. Chamberlain, Chief of Police, for conducting an officer, in writing scandalous letters to a young woman in Norwich. The suspension is during the pleasure of the Board.

The committee of the Congregational Church of this city have voted to invite the American Missionary Association to hold its twenty-fifth annual meeting here next fall.

HALIFAX. Genuine News from the "City of Boston."

All efforts to recover the bodies of Capt. Matthewson and Dr. McKean have failed. Sir W. E. Logan arrived here Saturday last. The writing found in the bottles washed ashore at Shediac and Newport, containing reports of the City of Boston, has been pronounced genuine, as the handwritings have been recognized.

THE PRESBYTERIANS. The Chicago General Assembly.

CHICAGO, May 30. The Presbyterian Assembly convened at 9 o'clock. Rev. Alex. Reed, D.D., from the special committee to whom were referred the report, and amendments offered to the report of the Committee on Finance of the Church, reported as follows: 1st. In order to systematizing and developing the liberality of our people, and fostering the aggressive interests of our Church in accomplishing the work assigned us in that province we think there shall be a Committee of Benevolence and Finance that shall consist of fifteen members, composed largely of business men of acknowledged skill in the management of financial affairs, and one member additional from each of the Boards. It shall be located in the city of New York, and it shall be its duty to use all proper means to promote throughout the Church regular and systematic consecration of property to the Lord, and to supervise the collection of funds for the whole benevolent work of the Church Committee, to be sent directly to the several boards and committees of the Church. 2d. It shall receive regular monthly statements of their receipts from all boards of Churches, that the financial condition of these boards, as well as the actual benevolence of each congregation, may be at all times before the committee. This committee shall also receive and report to the General Assembly, to be disbursed by the Assembly, any monies from Churches and individuals that may be given without any specific designation. The expenses of said committee shall be borne pro rata by the several boards. 3d. The Assembly enjoins upon all Churches the practice of periodic giving to all causes recommended by the General Assembly, according to the principles commanded in the Word of God. 4th. In order to carry out this plan, the General Assembly enjoins upon every Presbytery to appoint a standing committee on the benevolent work of the Church, which shall be the duty of that committee to use all means in its power to have brought before all of the congregations in the Presbytery the plans that may be recommended for securing contributions, and to give each pastor assistance in the execution of the various objects, and what is expected of each congregation. Every Presbytery is required to question each pastor, stated supply and elder present at every stated meeting in the spring and fall, whether the directions and recommendations on this subject have been complied with regarding the answers on the minutes. 5th. At least as often as once every six months these standing committees shall report to the Committee of Benevolence and Finance, so far as they can, in relation to the different objects for which contributions have been made by churches within the limits of the respective Presbyteries, with the amount contributed for each, together with such other information as to the general benevolent work of their churches and Presbyteries as shall seem necessary, or shall be called for by the Committee. 6th. No church, not complying with the regulations of the Assembly, shall be eligible for the several Boards, or make recommendations to the Assembly, or be members of the boards by their power to make nominations. 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
