PARIS.

A Stronger Government Talked of.

The Awful Massacre Continues.

PARIS, May 30.—Evening.

All is quiet and the victorious troops occupy the barracks. There is already a strong feeling in Paris that the Government is too weak to last. The awful massacre continues. At the barricades in Rue Rochefort in one ditch the wounded people found in it were buried alive. They groaned and shrieked dreadfully all night. An epidemic is feared from the number of dead bodies. Ridal was shot, so was Friedberg, the body of the latter was claimed by his widow. Forty thousand francs were found in his cellar the spoils of the republic. Matheson a member of the Commune was arrested, 170,000 francs were found upon him. The Versailles have placed back the statue of Henry Quatre, which had been thrown into the Seine. Okolivski has been taken out and shot. Millere was arrested at the Luxembourg. He resisted violently, and fired six shots from his revolver. He was taken to Paris, and a platoon of soldiers shot him. During the attack by the Versailles upon the barricade in the Place des Feternau, the Versailles lost their way and got mixed up, were taken prisoners, and fifty of them shot.

At the sitting of the Assembly to-day, Changarnier spoke about Metz, defending Bazaine. Thiers replied, calling Bazaine an illustrious warrior. The Duke of Audeput Pasquier proposed admitting the Orleans Princes into the Assembly. Picard replied that he would be happy to consider the subject.

The Clinchamps Corps of twenty thousand men have returned in triumph to Versailles, with 6,000 prisoners, who were discovered to be the Insurgents who murdered nine Dominican priests on Friday.

Rochefort Condemned.

LONDON, May 31.

The Times special from Versailles says Ernest Picard has resigned the Ministry of the Interior, and is succeeded therein by Victor Lefranc. The Monde announces that the Prince De Joinville and Duke D'Aumale have proclaimed their adherence to the manifesto of the Count De Chambord, and that the fusion of the legitimists and Orleanists is complete.

A Daily News special says that Rochefort has been condemned. General Lefo goes to St. Petersburg as Ambassador from France. He is succeeded as Minister of War by Gen. Cissey. Picard has been appointed Governor of the Bank of France. Francis Hugo writes a letter to the Independent Belge, giving details of the attack upon his father's house in Brussels, and asserting that the mob cried "Death to Hugo." The Belge disapproves of the expulsion of Hugo from Belgium.

VERSAILLES, May 31.

The Bishop of Orleans, M. Du Paulous, will be the successor of M. Darbois as Archbishop of Paris. Marshal McMahon, in a proclamation just issued, divides Paris into four commands, viz: East, North, Centre, and South. Gen. Vinoy is appointed to command the East. Gen. L'Amiral de Nemours, the Centre, the Centre, and Gen. Cissey the South. The civil power is transferred to the military, and no egross to or from the city will be permitted. It is reported that Piat has escaped from Paris. A million and a half francs were found upon the person of M. Matheson, an officer of the Commune, who was captured by the Versailles troops. The corpse of a member of the Commune, M. Varlin, was searched, and a thousand francs was discovered to amount to 400,000 francs. The adherent of Duke D'Aumale and the Bonapartists are both active in their schemes for the restoration of the Bourbon and Napoleon dynasties. All foreigners in Paris are required to register their names and addresses to the headquarters of the army. There are still a great number of unburied corpses in Belleville. It is said that many of the Paris insurgents were Englishmen; the reports occasions much bitterness toward England on the part of the French people. Some fears are felt that the walls of the Tuilleries and Hotel de Ville will fall. It is said that Gen. Cluseret has been executed. The court martial has ordered the use of mitrailleuses in case of wholesale executions. Several warships at Cherbourg have been transformed into hulks for the imprisonment of captured insurgents.

World's Special.

LONDON, May 31.

To-day's Paris advices say that the executions continue. Persons are denounced as soon as they are discovered in their hiding places and arrested and shot. WASHINGTON.

Mr. Colfax Going Home.

WASHINGTON, May 31. The health of Vice President Colfax continues to improve. He is to leave here for his home at South Bend, Ind., to-day. A special car which will make the trip in about thirty-six hours, is to go through without delay, has been prepared and every precaution will be taken to guard against any injurious effects from the journey.

Forty-three Men and Women Shot.

A Revolting Sight.

PARIS, May 31. The most revolting sight occurred this morning on the plaza in front of the Hotel De Ville. Thirty-three Communists, among whom were seven women, were shot in a body by a company of soldiers. Around three sides of the square troops to the number of fifteen hundred were drawn up under command of Col. Guesat. At 8 o'clock the prisoners, who had been confined in coal cellars back of Porter's Lodge in the Hotel De Ville, were brought out, their hands behind them, and then marched off by the main gateway through a double file of soldiers, and having reached the centre of the wide area in front of the Hotel De Ville, were ranged in a row and made to kneel down close together. There was nothing on the whole plaza. There were employed scavenger carts, which stood in a line at the rear of the prisoners. When the company was in line and ready to go, Col. Guesat stepped forward and told the prisoners in a few words they were to suffer death for having been caught in the act of setting fire to buildings and dwellings in Paris. At this moment the women uttered piercing shrieks, and began to say themselves back and forth. An officer advanced and made them keep still, with the flat of his sword. A few minutes afterwards a volley was fired, and when the smoke cleared away a most horrible sight was presented. Three of the women who were in the middle row, between the men, were still living, and writhing in awful agony. A second and third volley was fired, but not until the sixth did all the prisoners cease to live. The dead bodies were then flung into three scavenger carts, and carried away to be buried.

HAVER, May 31.

A society has been organized here, whose object is to prevent the resumption of intercourse between the French and Germans.

VERSAILLES, May 31.—Evening.

The publication and circulation of newspapers in the Department of the Seine, are made subject to special authorization by Marshal McMahon. M. Picard and Gen. Leflo, will soon retire from the Ministry. It is not known who will succeed them. Paris will remain for some time yet under military jurisdiction, but communication with the city is unrestricted, and entrance and exit are free to all. It is said the prisoners now in the hands of the government exceeds 40,000.

PARIS, May 31.—Evening.

Orders to set fire to buildings which had been previously marked by the Central and Safety Committees for destruction have been found on the insurgent prisoners. Omnibuses and cabs have commenced running again. The cafes, restaurants and places of amusement are opening their doors, but are ordered to be closed at midnight. All proprietors who disobey will be handed over to the military authorities. The Journal Des Debats has reappeared. Nearly all the newspapers which temporarily removed to Versailles have returned to Paris.

A New Journal, the Tri-Colour, advocates the restoration of the Orleans Princes on the ground that they will be a standing menace to Germany.

Kreutin, among the insurgent leaders captured at Vincennes, has been shot. Oscan, a member of the Commune, was delivered to the Versailles by the Prussians and soon afterward executed. The National Guards throughout France will be disbanded. Of the forty thousand prisoners at Versailles many will be sent for trial to the seaports. It is considered certain that Gen. Cissey will succeed Gen. Leflo as Minister of War.

Weather Report.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 31.

Synopsis for Past Twenty-Four Hours.

The pressure has recovered somewhat on the Pacific coast, with fresh south winds; has risen with clearing up weather at the Rocky Mountain stations, has risen rapidly in the Mississippi Valley, it has fallen from Alabama to Key West with threatening weather and light rains at the latter stations; has fallen heavily on the South Atlantic; has risen from Pennsylvania to Maine, and remains stationary on the lakes. Fresh south-east winds prevail generally on the Gulf coast and south-west winds from Florida to Delaware Bay. Threatening and rainy weather has increased in the Southern States, and rain has very generally fallen from Central Virginia to Eastern Pennsylvania and is threatening on the immediate New England coast. Clear and partially cloudy weather prevail north of the Ohio and Missouri rivers.

Probabilities.—It is probable that local rain storms will be experienced during the night on the immediate coast from Georgia to Maine, followed by clearing up weather on Thursday. Fresh south-westerly cloudy weather, with light winds, will probably prevail in the interior and on the lakes.

Prize Fight near Scranton.

NEW YORK, May 31.
