FRANCE.

PARIS, June 29. The Republican Committee has been unable to agree upon the combined ticket, and publish several electoral lists.

Many foreign officers are arriving in Paris to witness the review. McMahon has declined to be a candidate for Assembly from Paris.

VEVIAI, June 29. The trial of M. Rochefort is appointed for Monday next.

MAIRIE, June 29. The court martial in session here pronounced the following sentences: Cremonesi, Martin, Hostorg, Breton and Caust, transportation ten years, labor in the galleys, and Leparat ten years imprisonment.

ST. LOUIS, June 29. The committee having in charge the preparation of the list of premiums for cotton, to be given by the citizens of St. Louis, to the St. Louis Agricultural and Mechanical Fair, next October, completed their arrangements to-day, and have determined on the following scale of prizes:

For the best bale of long or short staple raised in Tennessee, \$500; second best bale, \$250; third best, \$100.

For the best bale of long or short staple raised in Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Missouri, also \$500 for the best bale from the best bale grown in any State, making an aggregate of \$1,000.

The building, previously devoted to the agricultural department of the fair will be used for a cotton display this year, and another building erected by the Fair Association for the exhibition of agricultural products.

In the United States Circuit Court to-day the case of the United States v. Thirty-seven boxes of sugar, appealed from the District Court, was decided in favor of the Government.

WASHINGTON.

Gen. Pleasanton Lays His Quarrel with Boutwell Before the President.

New York, June 29. A Tribune correspondent telegraphed last evening that among the first to call upon the President after his arrival yesterday morning was Gen. Pleasanton, with a written statement of his quarrel with Boutwell which he had during the past few days. It was prepared with great care.

Archbishop Patros has been arrested in Rome on a charge of conspiracy. The Mayor of Florence has paid a complimentary visit to the ambassadors whose presence has honored Florence while it has been the Capitol of Italy.

The Senate has ratified the treaty of commerce with the United States, and also has passed a bill for the unification of the judicial system.

SPAIN. MADRID, June 29. It is believed the Cortes will approve all financial bills submitted by Senor Moret.

RUSSIA. ST. PETERSBURG, June 29. The Russian government has suspended the publication of the Moscow Gazette, for disobedience to the law against rebellious language, concerning constituted authorities.

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NEW YORK CITY.

New York, June 29. Wm. Douglass, owner of the yacht Sappho, challenges any yacht on the Atlantic coast, to sail with him eight knots twenty miles to windward, and return, for \$5,000 or a set of colors. It is said Lord's yacht Wanderer will accept the challenge.

The Polaris left the navy yard of Brooklyn, this evening, and is now anchored off the Battery. She will take on her last stores and equipments, and leave for the North Pole to-morrow.

An employing painter, named Waldorf, fell from a window in Jersey City, last night, while intoxicated, and was fatally injured, and this morning two of his workmen, Germans, named Tanner and Bock, fell from a ladder on which they were painting, and were killed.

The benefit of the widow and orphans of the late Dan'l Simmons, manager of the Olympic Theatre, this afternoon, realized over \$1,500.

The subscriptions to the capital stock of the Viaduct Railway, books for which were distributed on Saturday, to have been \$70,000, though much secrecy attends the proceedings, and the directors refuse to give the exact amount.

Gould and Frederick Lowe, declaring that the compromise being sought by Health & Raphael, through a third party, by which the Erie Company should return 60,000 shares of stock and receive in exchange \$50,000 for legal expenses.

Southway at first assented to this arrangement, but finally receded from it. The case will probably be concluded to-morrow.

The dry goods commission merchants of this city have generally agreed to close their stores from Saturday until next Wednesday.

The hackmen formed a low fare association last night and adopted resolutions. Mrs. Eliza Constant's suit against the St. Albans church, to recover money advanced in aid of a church fair, resulted yesterday in a verdict in favor of Mrs. Constant for the principal and interest—\$4,480.

Alonzo B. Daw, Secretary of the Jersey City Insurance Company, left Jersey City on the 17th inst. for New Haven and Boston, and has not been heard from since. It is rumored that he has about \$10,000 belonging to the company.
