The Printing Frauds--Mr. Walker as a Cattle Fish.

The following appeared in a Charleston dispatch in the Cincinnati Enquirer of Saturday, and furnished the basis of a dispatch sent from Cincinnati Saturday by the agent of the Associated Press: ALLIED STATE PRINTING FRAUDS.

The Courier of to-day contains an article written by Mr. Walker, the State Printer, which makes some startling revelations concerning printing frauds which are alleged to have been perpetrated by his predecessor, one of the proprietors of the Wheeling Intelligencer. It is charged that during two years the public printer drew from the Treasury over \$15,000 upon illegal and fraudulent vouchers, and that he also received a large profit on paper which the law requires to be furnished at cost.

Of course, we shall ask to be counted out if the majority shall decide to make Free Trade a plank in their platform. The Protection of Home Industry is of more importance, in our view, than the success of any party or ticket. If it should be decided to make Free Trade a cornerstone of the Cincinnati movement, we ask only that we be not insulted by the assumption that any possible selection of candidates could reconcile us to that decision.

We are quite aware that it may be found advisable to adopt a Free Trade plank, despite our repugnance thereto. If the masses want Free Trade, they ought to be gratified, no matter though at the cost of repelling this or that dissenter. The Convention will, we doubt not, consider thoroughly and determine wisely on this point as on others.

All we ask--and it is no more than every honest man has a right to ask--is plain speaking. If the Convention decides to make free trade a plank in its platform, let it express that determination in plain, unambiguous language. Such juggling phrases as "Revenue Reform," should be scouted from the vocabulary of the earnest and true friend of the Cincinnati protection.

We do not ask nor desire any utterance from Cincinnati in the name of protection. We ask only that that freedom to differ on economic questions which has always been cherished by Republicans may still be conceded and maintained. We only say that, should Protectionists be virtually ruled out of the Cincinnati movement, a hint without a kick will suffice them.

The suggestion of the Enquirer's correspondent that "the recent flurry about the accounts of the present printer seems to have been gotten up for the purpose of screening the former swindler" is simply absurd. So far as we are aware the accounts of Mr. Walker's predecessor had never been questioned and there was no occasion to "screen" them.

It may serve to help explain the appearance of this article in the Courier to say that we learned a few days ago that charges were to be brought against Mr. Walker, in the Convention for overcharging on work done for that body. The resolutions bringing them had been drawn, and not by Republican hands. It seems very probable one motive for getting up this roosterback was to affect popular opinion at Charleston and stop the threatened exposure in the Convention.

Greeley on the Cincinnati Convention.

From Saturday's Tribune. There is to be a National Convention of Liberal Republicans at Cincinnati, assembling on the 1st of May next--so much is certain. It will meet uncommitted to any course of action, whether with regard to measures or men. If it should see fit to construct or adopt what is called a Platform, it will do so; should it choose to recommend candidates for President and Vice President, it will also do that. But neither its platform nor its ticket will have any higher or other authority than their intrinsic worth shall give them. If they commend themselves to your judgment, very well; if they do not, your perfect right to reject and oppose them is unquestioned.

On certain grave public questions--such as Universal Amnesty, Civil Service Reform, and the propriety of rendering Presidents and other dispensers of extensive patronage ineligible to re-election while in office--we infer that there will be no diversity of opinion. As to what is meant by "Revenue Reform," there will be of course a wide divergence of opinion. There are those who are attracted to the Cincinnati movement mainly, if not solely, by the hope that they may make it serve effectively their sincere, earnest, bitter hostility to Protection. And these will naturally make themselves felt in the deliberations and councils of the Convention.

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Mr. Sumner and the Cincinnati Convention.

The following is the Tribune's dispatch referred to by telegraph this morning: WASHINGTON, Friday, Mar. 15, 1872. A new era is about to occur in politics.
