CITY COUNCIL

An adjourned meeting of the Second Branch was held last evening—Present, Mr. Forbes, President, and Messrs. Altmyer, Baird, Clator, Caldwell, Crawford, O. J. Hobbs, Howell, Kammer, Lancaster, List, McCadam, O'Brien, Phillips, Simpson, Simpson, Smith, G. Steger, Viewig, Waterhouse and Weisberger.

The reading of the minutes of the last two meetings was dispensed with. The Committee on Police, to which was referred the report in relation to the releasing prisoners, reported that only the Judge of the Police Court is authorized to release before trial persons arrested, but that it has been the custom of the Sergeant to do so, ever since the Court was established, of depositing as security an amount to pay the fine and costs.

Report of Streets and Alleys was returned from the First Branch with an amendment, which was concurred in. Another arming the Committee on Health with power to purchase disinfectants, to employ labor and to purchase disinfectants, was amended by striking out the requirement that their acts be subsequently approved by Council and adopted.

An ordinance in relation to a subscription to the capital stock of the Wheeling & Ohio Union Railroad Company (Railroad) was read, and Mr. Handlan moved that it be laid on the table and printed. He was met with the objection that it would cost something to print, and that any order involving any cost must originate in the Second Branch. Mr. Handlan said it ought to be printed for public information. For his part he would not vote either for the subscription or for the ordinance, unless the city shall be fully guaranteed in every shape and form that the work will be completed.

Mr. Wilson said the present proposition was simply to submit the question of a subscription to the people. It would still be a question for the discretion of the Council, even after the subscription should be authorized by the people, whether they would make it, and would not make it except on proper guaranties.

Mr. Handlan said he was in favor of the bridge, but he did not think it advisable to build it unless they could have something more than Mr. McCullough's road. He did not know what guaranties the Railroad Committee had of a new road, but for his part he thought they had better wait a little while till the facts were well ascertained.

Mr. Stanton moved to add to the first section of the ordinance the following: "Provided, however, that the subscription herein provided for shall not be made unless the sum of \$500,000 shall be first subscribed by other responsible individuals or corporations to the capital stock of said company."

This was opposed by Mr. Wilson, who said it would be a proper enough provision when Council comes to make the subscription. Gov. Stanton said this was to be a limitation on the Council so that it should not under any circumstances without other responsible guaranties, make a subscription to the capital stock of the railroad, and then come an additional \$500,000 for the railroad, and he was in favor of, if we can secure the bridge by proper guaranties against misappropriation of the money. He thought it would make the proposition stronger with the people to put this protection and guaranty in this ordinance, because it would inspire confidence.

The amendment was rejected by the following vote:—Yea—Messrs. Handlan and Stanton. Nay—Messrs. Blair, Booth, Butterfield, Ewing, Hester, Schramm, Weldbush and Wilson.

A resolution of the Second Branch, requesting the trustees of the Gas Works to furnish a 4-inch pipe to replace the 3-inch pipe between John and Quincy, another authorizing them to contract for a gas holder and exhauster, were referred to Council at its next meeting, yeas 20, nays none.

Referred to the Committee on Lights with instructions to contract with Mr. Jefferson, to give bond for the faithful performance of the contract.

The following was offered: Resolved, That the Committee on Ordinances be directed to report an ordinance at the regular meeting of Council in May, providing for the sale of tickets for the return trip, likewise. Under this arrangement, the sale of tickets will commence next Tuesday. The fare for the round trip on this city and return will be about \$10 25. This is only a small excess over half fare.
