FOREIGN.

FRANCE. Enthusiasm over the Evacuation of Reims.

PARIS, November 7.—There is great enthusiasm in Reims over the evacuation of that city by the Germans.

BALTIMORE, November 7.—There is no abatement in the horse disease. The cars on all the lines were taken off Saturday. None will run this week.

NEW HAVEN, November 7.—The horse disease is at its height here. No horse cars have been running for a week past.

CHICAGO, November 7.—There is a marked increase in the number of horses on the streets this morning, though all show some traces of the epidemic.

PHILADELPHIA, November 7.—The weather has cleared off, and more horses appeared on the streets this morning. Some of the passenger cars are remaining in the city.

MONTPELIER, Vt., November 7.—The horses in the State are all sick, and all the mails, except by railroad, are suspended, hence it is impossible to give anything like a full vote of the State yet.

LOUISVILLE, November 7.—The reports of the horse disease here are untrue. No authentic case has yet occurred in the city.

BALTIMORE, November 7.—An election was held to-day in the Sixth Ward to fill a vacancy in the City Council.

WASHINGTON, November 7.—The following are reported majorities for Grant in this State:

Calderwell county, 440; Lynn, 200; Motter, 550; Greece, 300; Polk, 173; Jasper, 500; Newton, 75; Benton, 150; Andrew, 100; Nowaday, 100.

Clinton county, 440; Webster, 45; Macon, 600; Carroll, 238; Livingston, 200; Pettis, 300; Vernon, 750; Adair, 630; Cole, 178; Iron, 200; Ray, 800; Cooper, 800; Jefferson, 400; Washington, 330; Charlton, 1,000; St. Francis, 235; Morgan, 278; Randolph, 1,400; Crawford, 300; Johnson, 235.

St. Louis, November 7.—The following additional counties of this State have been reported to have voted for Grant:

For Greeley—St. Clair, 138; Mississippi, 388; Bates, 240; Grant, 150; Clinton, 330; Gasconade, 602; Randolph, 815; Marion, 1,000.

For Grant—Dade, 200; Boston, 200; De Kalb, 178; Washington, 387; Laclede, 300; Shelby, 430; Atchison, 367; Nowaday, 168; Worth, 97; Lawrence, 100; Greene, 418; Christian, 355.

In most of the counties heard from Woodson, Democrat, for Governor, runs ahead of Greeley, and Henderson, Republican, for Governor, runs slightly behind Grant.

Parker, Republican, for Congress, in the 9th District, has about 200 majority, Crittenden, Democrat, in the 7th District, beats Burdett about 1,000.

Complete returns from this county show that the Republicans have lost their sheriff, and probably the most of the county officers that they have been claiming.

MARYLAND. NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—A Baltimore dispatch says the State outside of that city gives 2,900 majority for Grant. Greeley everywhere is far behind the ticket for Congress.

NEW JERSEY. NEWARK, November 7.—New Jersey goes for Grant by nearly 14,000. The Republican Congressmen in the State have about 18,000 majority.

OHIO. DATTON, November 7.—Greeley's majority in Montgomery county is 104, a gain of 240 for Grant.

PENNSYLVANIA. PHILADELPHIA, November 7.—The Board of Returns Judges officially announce the majority for Grant in this city at 44,546.

TENNESSEE. MEMPHIS, November 7.—The official vote of Shelby county, exclusive of the 11th district, gives Greeley 6,158; Grant, 8,151. For Governor, Brown 6,557; Freeman, 8,076.

For Congressman at large, Chestnut 3,520; Maynard 7,901; Johnson 2,974. For Congressman, Ninth district, Hayes 9,910; Lewis 7,893. The majorities are: Grant 1,938; Freeman 1,519; Maynard, over Johnson and Chestnut, 1,397; Lewis 1,953.

The citizens' Legislative ticket put forward a few days before the election, was elected by over 3,000. It is: For Senators, A. D. Lacy and Virginia Lewis; Democrats, Representatives, Overton, Hayden, Hulshoff, Ward and Brown; Democrats; Williamson, Republican; Lewis, Republican candidate for Congress, will have a majority of about 2,000.

Henry county gives Greeley, 1,250; Grant, 578; Brown, 1,284; Freeman, 681; Chestnut, 1,328; Maynard, 300; Johnson, 493.

Seventh District, Atkins, Democrat, 1,355; Travis, 764. One precinct to hear from. Lauderdale county gives Greeley, 815; Grant, 483. Governor, Brown, 845; Freeman, 484. Congressmen at Large, Johnson, 342; Chestnut, 602; Maynard, 405.

Eighth District, Congress, Campbell, 1,051; Madison county gives Greeley, 1,951; Grant, 1,421. Governor, Brown, 1,235; Freeman, 1,330. Congressmen at Large, Chestnut, 1,328; Maynard, 1,281; Johnson, 473.

Ninth District, Cong., Campbell, 1,088; Caldwell, 881; Bell, 90; Nevin, 1,800. One precinct to hear from. Haywood county gives Greeley, 8,094; Grant, 1,330. Governor, Freeman, 3,036; Maynard, 284; Johnson, 350; Chestnut, 1,139.

District, Congress, Nevin, 3,095; Caldwell, 240; Campbell, 1,015; Bell, 65. In Harlan county Chestnut's majority over Johnson is 865. Brown over Grant, 493. Hayes over Lewis 465.

Nashville, November 7.—Reports of the election received here from Democratic and Republican sources make the Congressional delegation stand as follows: First District, Butler, Republican; Second, Thornburg, Republican; Third, Crutchfield, Republican; Fourth, Bright, Democrat; Fifth, Harrison, Republican; Sixth, Gibbs, Republican; Seventh, Atkins, Democrat; Eighth, Nevin, Republican; Ninth, Lewis, Republican; for the State at large, Maynard. If subsequent figures make no change the delegation will stand 8 Republicans to 2 Democrats. It was not expected that the Republicans would carry under the appointment law more than two districts. The Democrats do not yet give up. Whitehouse in the Sixth District, though they concede the election of Maynard.

The returns from middle and west Tennessee, show that Brown has lost heavily upon his vote for Governor in 1870, and those are entertained in Democratic quarters. The Republicans expected no such result, and are astonished at the prospects. Brown's losses in Williamson, Giles, Chestnut, Madison, Sanderland, Hardeman, Weakly, Henry, Shelby, Davidson, DeKalb, Smith and Lincoln counties, amount to 10,000, whilst Freeman makes a gain of 1,000 in Haywood. If the same relative loss is kept up in middle and west Tennessee, Brown may be overwhelmed by Freeman's majority in east Tennessee. The Republicans have made large gains in the Legislature, but there is nothing definite yet as to the complexion of that body.

MEMPHIS, November 7.—A dispatch from Jackson, Tennessee, to-night says that Nunn, Republican, is undoubtedly elected to Congress in the 8th District.

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ARKANSAS.

TWO OR THREE THOUSAND FOR GRANT. LITTLE ROCK, November 7.—Baxter is reported to have the following majorities in the counties named:

Jefferson, 3,800; Phillips, 3,000; Mississippi, 400; Randolph, 120; Independence, 200; Clark, 200; Woodruff, 200; Jackson, 100; Arkansas, 50; Crittenden, 1,800; Union, 500; Perry, 100. Most of these are large negro counties.

Brooks has the following majorities: Pulaski, 100; St. Francis, 55; Prairie, 54; Conway, 500; Hot Springs, 39; White, 100; Craighead, 400; Cross, 350; Ouachita, 400; Nevada, Columbia, Andrew, Grant, a Republican majority about 1,000.

The indications are that Baxter is elected and the State goes for Grant by 6,000 or 8,000. The Legislature is Republican. Asa Hodges, Republican, is probably elected to Congress in the 1st District; Snyder in the 2d, and Thomas M. Gunter, Democrat, in the 3d.

ALABAMA. MEMPHIS, November 6.—Decatur, Ala., this county gives Grant 633; Greeley 212. Morgan, Madison, Limestone and Blount counties give small Republican majorities. Montgomery, November 7.—The election in this State is still in doubt. The Republican gain is unexpectedly large in the northern counties.

The gains and losses are computed on the basis of the Smith and Lindsey vote in 1870, and foot up as follows: Gains, 9,500; losses, 10,500. This embraces the unofficial returns from 23 counties polling considerably more than one-half of the vote in the State, and indicates the election of the Republican State ticket by a small majority. Greeley ran slightly behind the State ticket. The Legislature is doubtful, but the Democrats claim a small majority in both houses. For Congress, Sloss and Caldwell, for the 6th and 6th Districts, are certainly elected. Hodley, Democrat, seems to be defeated in the 3rd District by Pelham, Republican. Bramberg, Liberal, is elected from the 1st District by 2,000 majority.

FLORIDA. Reported Probably for Greeley. NEW YORK, November 7.—A dispatch from Jacksonville says Florida is closely contested, and will go for Greeley.

INDIANA. What the Banner Democratic County Did. FORT WATKINS, November 7.—The official returns from this county, Democratic county of Indiana, show that Grant received 318 more votes than were cast for General Brown in October, while Greeley received 1178 less than Hendricks. O'Connor received 119 votes in the county. The total vote was 714 less than in October, which shows that a great many Democrats voted for Grant.

ILLINOIS. Congress Delegation Twelve Republicans and Seven Democrats. CHICAGO, November 7.—Further returns indicate the election of Morrison, Democrat, to Congress in the 17th District over Hay, Republican. If this is correct the Illinois delegation will stand twelve Republicans and seven Democrats.

KANSAS. Thirty Thousand for Grant. TOPEKA, November 7.—From the returns received here by the Republican party, it is estimated that Grant's majority in the State will be 30,000.

ATCHISON, November 7.—Grant's majority in Atchison county is 591; Republican State ticket about the same and county ticket over 500 majority. Donegan county, Grant 1,900 majority; Brown, 590; Nemaha, 630; Marshall, 700; Washington, 600; Jackson, 400; Jefferson, 300.

Every county north of the Kansas River will give Grant a majority ranging from 130 to 1,200, aggregating 10,000 to 15,000, and most of them send Republicans to the Legislature.

KENTUCKY. LOUISVILLE, November 7.—The returns are still very meagre, but enough are received, however, to indicate that Grant has carried four of the ten Congressional Districts, with two doubtful and four certain for Greeley. The Democratic nominees for Congress are elected in all the districts, except Bark, Republican, in the Tenth, and Wood, Republican, in the Ninth. The result is not yet certain in the Eighth, but the indications favor Durham, Democrat.

The Republican State Committee concede that the State has gone for Greeley by 7,000 to 10,000.

LOUISIANA. NEW ORLEANS, November 7.—Unofficial returns from thirty-seven parishes outside the city give a net Republican majority of 9534. The net Republican majority in 1870 in same parishes was 1,830. The remaining sixteen parishes in 1870 give a net Republican majority of 1,215. With the same rate of gains the Liberals will carry the State by a handsome majority.

MICHIGAN. 55,000 to 60,000 for Grant. DETROIT, November 7.—Grant's majority in this State is from \$5,000 to 60,000. All the Republican Congressmen are elected. Field, First District, 2,000; Waldron, Second District, 7,000; Willard, Third District, 8,000; Barrows, Fourth District, 5,000; Foster, Fifth District, 6,000; Bigs, Sixth District, 8,500; Conyer, Seventh District, 9,500; Bradley, Eighth District, 15,000; Hubbard, Ninth District, probably 4,000. The Democrats may have elected one member to the Senate, while the House has not more than seven or eight Democrats out of 110 members.

MINNESOTA. 20,000 for Grant—All Three Republican Congressmen Elected. ST. PAUL, November 7.—Minnesota will give Grant over 20,000 majority. The full city vote for Mayor, with only two districts missing, is as follows: Lawrence, 48,533; O'Brien, 34,433; Havermeyer, 41,616.
