CHARLESTON.

Adjoinsment of the Legislature.—The Road Law Defeated. Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer. CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 7.—The Legislature adjourned at 11 o'clock to-day, to meet again the 30th of October.

THE WRECK OF THE ATLANTIC.

The Investigation at Halifax. HALIFAX, April 7.—The investigation into the Atlantic disaster was resumed this morning.

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NEW YORK CITY.

New York, April 7.—The trial of Joe Sichel, a butcher charged with poisoning his wife last October, began in Brooklyn to-day.

Judge Tappin on application for the release of Mrs. Myers, the witness in the Goodrich case, to-day granted a writ of habeas corpus, returnable to-morrow.

Recorder Hackett, in his charge to the Grand Jury to-day urged them to deal with offenders against the usury laws, saying the theft of industry and of regular profits by means of immoral and unlawful machinations of capitalists or money institutions ought to command your attention, much more than ordinary larceny.

At the Legislative inquiry into the Erie Railroad affairs to-day, a letter was read from John Williamson and Frederick A. Grammer the ex-clerks, promising to show if the books were produced that the Companies statement of freight and passenger was honest and reliable, and that the letter the clerks were called and testified that, while they could not point out specific inaccuracies in the absence of the books they were satisfied the returns of the agents were correct, that a dividend might be declared, as the dividend of the road in 1872 was not as large as in 1871.

Henry T. Antes related a conversation with President Watson, after the last day of the examination, the point of which was, Watson offered him a lucrative position in the Erie office, which he refused to accept, as he considered an attempt to bribe him.

Mr. Beach, Counsel for O'Doherty stated that his client was now perfectly satisfied that the accounts of the company had not been falsified and the present management was honest and reliable, and that Oliver W. Cooke and Col. Durant, auditors of the Erie Company testified to the statement of the net earnings, on which the dividend declared was from actual and apparently correct returns.

Up to recess to-day the only new point added in the Mutual Life Insurance Company investigation, was that Police Commissioner Manniere had obtained \$6,000, said to have been used at Washington to relieve the Company from taxation, and charged to the account of legal expenses.

The men of the New York Gas Company are the only ones on the strike, the employees of the other companies refusing, thus far, to join them. The police in large force are still on duty. To-day is cloudy and dark, and the banks, mercantile houses and saloons down town are lighted by candles and lamps.

McDonnell, the alleged principle in the forgeries on the Bank of England, was brought before Judge Woodruff to-day on a writ of habeas corpus, but at the request of the counsel for the British government the case was adjourned till to-morrow.

Eugene E. Finkney, who keeps a banking and exchange office in the basement of No. 68 Wall street, was to-day arrested and lodged in Ludlow Street Jail on the charge of swindling a German emigrant out of \$300.

There is a full supply of gas in the downtown districts to-night. The strikers say they will hold out. No disturbance is reported to-day, and all the men are at work except those discharged by the New York Company. A committee of the workmen now employed by the Manhattan Company waited on the leader of the strikers of the New York Company to-day to make arrangements to strike.

The counsel for Robert Bleakley, charged with the murder of M. O'Reilly, to-day applied for delay in order to obtain peremptory challenges to the jury, and the prisoner's insanity. Decision reserved.

Miss Laura Keane, actress, has brought suit against C. E. Breisler, of the American Literary Bureau, to recover \$15,000 damages for alleged libel.

THE CONNECTION ELECTION.

HARTFORD, April 7.—The election to-day was the quietest in the city since the last year, and a tight vote was polled, traveling being very bad in many parts. It is the general opinion that there will be no election of Governor by the people, the prohibition ticket tending to prevent either of the leading candidates from getting a majority.

LONDON, April 7.—Parliament will adjourn from to-night to the 21st inst.

HEALTH OF THE POPE.

ROME, March 7.—The Pope, owing to his feeble condition, is forbidden leaving his apartments.

FRANCE.

PARIS, April 7.—The Republicans have carried the municipal elections in Nantes and Marseilles.

OHIO ELECTION.

COLUMBUS, April 7.—The election passed off very quietly. The returns come in so slowly that anything more than crude guesses are useless. The indications are that Bull, the Democratic candidate for Mayor is elected. Hickley and Barber, both Democratic candidates for the Constitutional Convention, are probably elected.

CINCINNATI, April 7.—The election returns for this city are coming in very slowly and it is impossible at this time to indicate definitely anything about the final result. Four wards report giving to Davis, Republican Mayor, over the Presidential vote, the larger part of which has been in the German wards. The indications are now that Johnson, Democratic and Liberal Republican, is elected by over 1,000 to 2,000 majority.

CINCINNATI, April 7.—The returns up to one o'clock have been coming in so slowly that aside from the office of Mayor, comparatively little is known. Eight wards and precincts show a gain of 844 for Davis, Republican Mayor, over the Presidential vote, the larger part of which has been in the German wards.
