DISTRICT COURT.—The Menagerie Insurance case occupied the attention of this court the whole of yesterday. The past day or two have been taken up with the discussion of law points. It cannot now be stated with any degree of certainty when the conclusion of this case will be reached, but it will not be before the second or third day of next week.

ADJOURNED UNTIL THE USUAL HOUR THIS MORNING. HEAVY BLOW.—Yesterday afternoon about 8 o'clock, this city was visited with the most violent wind storm of the decade, possibly within the memory of the oldest inhabitant. For an hour or two previous to the blow, there were indications of a storm of some kind, but we don't believe anybody expected the wind would come down upon us with the violence of a tornado, which it did. The only damage we have heard of beyond a general "blowing up" of dry goods in front of stores, the prostration of fences, and the bringing down of dead limbs from trees, was that sustained by Mrs. Bradley, Messrs. Friend & Son, and the owner of the round ice house on Seventh street, below Clay.

THE THIRD STORY WALLS of an addition to the woolen factory of Mrs. B., now in process of erection, were thrown down, and those of the second story damaged to some extent. The bricks and timbers fell upon a small tenement house and injured it somewhat. Fortunately no one was hurt about either building.

CHURCH DEDICATION AT WEST ALEXANDER.—The new United Presbyterian church in West Alexander was dedicated, Thursday. The day being favorable, the church was filled to its utmost capacity with an attentive audience.

EASTER.—To-morrow will be Easter, the festival of the resurrection of our Lord, or the Christian passover. The early Christians differed in regard to the time of celebrating this festival, but the dispute was finally settled by the Council of Nice, A. D. 325, which adopted the rule which makes Easter day to be always the first Sunday after the full moon, which happens upon or next after March 21; and if the full moon happens on a Sunday, Easter is the Sunday after. By this arrangement, Easter may come as early as March 22, or as late as April 25.

TO KEEP THE PEACE.—Mrs. Minnie Bier was brought before Judge Johnston, yesterday afternoon, on complaint of Mrs. Margaret Miller. It was alleged that Mrs. Bier threatened to burn the house in which Mrs. M. resided. The accused was required to give security in one hundred dollars to keep the peace six months. She gave the bond and was released.

Mrs. Bier lodged a complaint against Mrs. Miller that she was afraid she (Mrs. M.) would do her some bodily harm. The testimony in this case was also heard, yesterday afternoon, and the defendant was held to bail in the same amount and for a similar purpose.
