THE COURTS.—Circuit Court.—Judge Melvin.

The further hearing of the liquor cases having been postponed at the adjournment on Wednesday until Monday morning, and miscellaneous business until to-day, but little was done on yesterday except "waiting for the verdict" in the cases of State vs. Heller & Watt, and same vs. Cletus Hauser.

An order authorizing surviving commissioners to convey, was entered in the case of Steel vs. Wm. Montgomery and others, trustees of the South Wheeling M. E. Church.

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DELAIRI ITEMS.—At an adjourned meeting of the city council Wednesday night, the following business was transacted:

Morgan in the chair—and the meeting adjourned on the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

On motion the bond and contract of Mr. Thomas Ward and the city of Belleaire for the numbering of the houses in the city was approved.

On motion, Messrs. Criswell and Morgan, a committee appointed to wait upon the township trustees and request them to make the city of Belleaire whole as to the amount of money expended by the city on the pike.

On motion of Mr. Leisure, the Mayor was authorized to receive bids until Tuesday evening next for repairing Cummins gutter.

On motion, an ordinance to pay sundry claims was received and put upon its first reading and finally passed.

By a motion of Mr. Criswell, Captain Garrett was permitted to make some remarks relative to business from House Committee on the matter referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

By a motion of Mr. Shupe, it was ordered that the B. & O. Railroad Company be notified to pave in front of their grounds on the north side of Central Avenue, and on the east side of Noble street.

On motion, the City Clerk was authorized and ordered to hurry up the matter of paving as rapidly as possible.

The City Solicitor was authorized to prepare an ordinance authorizing the issuing of another bond to pay off the residue of the wharf debt of the city.

On motion an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to prohibit immoral and improper practices in Belleaire," was taken from the table for the purpose of allowing amendments that might be considered proper, and after some debate regarding the propriety of striking out section 11, on motion of Mr. Criswell, the ordinance was taken from the table.
