HOUSE OF DELEGATES. SATURDAY, November 13, 1875.

Legislative Business.

The House convened at 10 o'clock, and the session was opened with prayer by the Rev. Bishop of the Episcopal Church. The following resolutions were offered: Mr. Tanner: That the Governor be requested to return all bills vetoed by him during the session previous to the recess. Rejected.

Legislative Business.

Mr. Spencer: That a Committee of Seven be appointed to examine the duty of the Legislature in what manner the State School Funds are invested and secured. Adopted. Mr. Morgan: Requiring the Committee on Taxation and Finance to report a bill providing for the equalization of assessments on State Lands. Adopted.

WASHINGTON.

REORGANIZING THE PARTY.

As the first step in that direction they are working for the appointment of Judge Morton a Republican as postmaster at Richmond, in place of Miss Ann C. Taylor, a Democrat.

NEW ORLEANS, November 13.—The Committee on Information and Statistics of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange, to whom have been intrusted the duty of compiling a monthly cotton crop report made up from the returns of the various Exchanges appointed therefor by the National Cotton Exchange of America, beg leave to submit the following for the month of November, for the New Orleans Department and Cotton Exchange covering that part of the State of Mississippi not apportioned to the Memphis and Mobile Cotton Exchanges, the State of Louisiana and State of Arkansas south of the Arkansas river.

NEW YORK.

Mrs. Moulton and Plymouth Church. NEW YORK, November 13.—Mrs. E. C. Moulton last evening served a paper upon Thos. C. Shearman, as clerk of Plymouth Church. In it Mr. Moulton calls upon Plymouth Church to join with her in calling a council of churches, before which the action of Plymouth Church in dropping her name from its roll may be brought. A prominent Congregational clergyman said yesterday that the action of Plymouth Church and Deacon West may result in a call on the part of the churches for a mutual council.

A Court Scene.

LOUISVILLE, November 14.—The verdict of guilty was duly received by the Ku-Klux prisoners, Snoot, Anon and Melfer. When convicted, they were presented before Judge Emmons to receive their punishment. The Judge first addressed himself to Snoot. He said personally that he did not believe him to be a thief; he saw nothing in his character that would cause him to believe that any man's property would not be safely placed in his hands, but he had been carried away by local feelings which caused a combination of purpose to commit a high crime; he had perhaps never evil in his heart, but strange circumstances surrounding the feeling in the local community had induced him to join in a mob purpose, and he had committed one of the most dangerous crimes. So far as the court was aware he had never wronged any one in the ordinary walks of life.

Civil Service Reform.

ST. LOUIS, November 13.—Judge Kregel, of the United States District Court for the Western District of Missouri, today sentenced Colonel John A. Joyce, ex-revenue agent, to 2 years and 6 months in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$3,000. A High Order. HAVANA, November 13.—Captain General Valmieda has issued a decree prohibiting persons living between the lines formed by Sagua Maguaya and Polimilla, from travelling after dark, warning them they may be shot at sight by pickets and patrols.

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FOREIGN NEWS.

ENGLAND.

A Tidal Wave. ENGLAND, November 13.—A Tidal wave ten feet high swept up Parrett near Somersetshire to-day, and the dock gates burst, several vessels broke from their mooring, and one was sunk. PRINCE OF WALES. The Prince of Wales arrived to-day at Poonah, and had an enthusiastic reception. It is doubtful if he can visit Madras, owing to the cholera in that place.

FRANCE.

The Centennial Statue. PARIS, November 14.—The Franco-American Union for the erection of the Centennial statue in New York harbor is organizing for a grand fête to take place at the Paris D'Industrie on the 10th inst. President MacMahon, the members of the Cabinet, nearly all deputies and other distinguished persons have subscribed to the statue fund, and several of the principal cities of France have voted contributions.

SPAIN.

MADRID, November 14.—Gen. Quesada is establishing a line of fortifications between Victoria and Lagrona and has occupied the entire district of Rioja. The Carlists in attempting to prevent his movements were repulsed with heavy losses. RUSSIA. Ready for Service. ST. PETERSBURG, November 13.—All of the troops in the frontier of Russia as well as three divisions in this military district are said to be made ready for active service. AUSTRIA. VIENNA, November 13.—Herzegovina will soon send a deputation to Vienna, Berlin and St. Petersburg, to present a petition embodying their wishes.
