WASHINGTON.

The Warm Spring Indian Delegation and Their Hotel Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 19.—A party of Warm Spring Indians arrived here a few days ago and went to the Washington House, and then called on the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. The Commissioner told them that if they would go to the Tremont House their board while there would be paid by the Government. The Indians chose to remain where they were, and the result is an unpaid bill, for which the proprietor threatens to retain the baggage of the Indians.

TEXAS-PACIFIC RAILROAD.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., November 19.—The Texas-Pacific Railroad Convention met at the Opera House at 11:30 this morning, and was called to order by Frank D. Clark, Chairman of the Executive Committee, who nominated Hon. J. W. Clapp, of Memphis, for temporary chairman, who took the stand and delivered an address of welcome and entered into the merits of Memphis as one of the terminal points of the Southern Pacific Railroad, and showed the advantages of Memphis by the road of the thirty-second parallel over the Northern Pacific.

GERMANY.

BERLIN, November 19.—The list of German exhibitors to be at the Philadelphia exhibition next year numbers 1,240. The Presidents of the Provinces at the suggestion of the Emperor, are collecting the articles connected with the treatment of wounded soldiers in the field, which will be exhibited together.

NO ALMONY FOR CONQUERORS.

The action of Chief Justice White, in discharging Brigham Young from alleged contempt for disobedience to the order of Judge McKean requiring him to pay an alimony to Ann Eliza, is satisfactory to the Government.

It is the opinion of the Attorney General that the woman in question, in marrying Brigham Young violated the United States statutes, and therefore cannot avail herself of her own wrong.

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FOREIGN NEWS.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, November 19.—Cabinet Councils have been held almost daily during the past week. It is believed there have been reiterations of peaceful assurances by the Russian newspapers. There are, however, indications of an early intervention in Turkish affairs, according to an arrangement of the Powers that participated in the Treaty of Paris.
