CITY COUNCIL—SPECIAL MEETING OF FIRST BRANCH

An adjourned meeting of the First Branch of the City Council was held last evening. Present: Baird, Blair, Cowan, Egerton, Hall, McAdams, Roberts, Schramm, Wallace. In the absence of Mayor Dr. Baird was called to the chair.

The Second Branch not being in session, the reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

Bill of Hanes & Wilson for Water Works repairs amounting to \$129.52, was referred to the Committee on Real Estate for report.

Several small bills reported from the Second Branch were ordered paid. The case of John H. Blair, in whom was granted a coffee house license, was approved and filed.

The action of the Second Branch, appropriating \$500 for the widow of J. G. Oliver, who lost his life at the burning of Washington Hall, was non-concurring. The resolution recommending the President of the Street Railway Co. to have the track of his road extended to 45th street, received from the Second Branch, was referred to the Committee on Railroads.

The rules for the government of the workhouse were then taken from the table, and considered by the First Branch, and without transacting any other business the Branch adjourned.
