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THE ALLEN-GOSS FIGHT. Goss the Winner in Twenty-One Rounds—Allen Arrested.

CINCINNATI, September 7.—The point chosen for the fight between Allen and Goss, the well-known pugilist, was on the Louisville Short Line Railroad, 18 miles from Cincinnati.

Second round—Allen strikes Goss on the eye with a right hand, and Goss has given Allen some heavy body blows. Goss' mouth bleeding; a fall for Allen.

Third round—Close fighting; Allen winning. At this point the militia appeared, but the fighting still goes on.

Fourth round—Exchanges fast and heavy. Allen, by a terrible blow on Goss' neck, knocked him down.

Fifth round—Allen struck out and fell sharp on Goss' face. In return he received a blow in the stomach. This did not appear to worry Allen much.

Sixth round—Both men promptly to the scratch. Allen leading off getting in some heavy blows, getting in the mouth of Goss, and damaging his right eye.

Seventh round—When time was called the Covington Light Guards appeared. After being dispersed by the military a second ring was formed a short distance from the first.

Eighth round—Goss threw Allen, though the former was severely punished. Ninth round—Goss forced fighting. Allen finished the round for himself with heavy blows on Goss' face.

Tenth round—Heavy blows exchanged. Goss was forced on the ropes, and the fighters were parted by the seconds.

Eleventh round—Goss leads the fight. The hardest fighting is in this round. Twelfth round—Both men are badly swollen. Allen knocks Goss down.

Thirteenth round—Terroric blow on Goss' mouth. Fourteenth round—Goss throws Allen by clinch. Foul claimed but not allowed.

Fifteenth round—Heavy and close fighting. Both men are badly swollen. In chasing Allen about the ring Goss slipped and fell.

Hartranft has issued death warrants for the execution of Thomas Manly, James Carroll, James Boyle, Hugh McGehean and James Ray, the Molly Maguires who were recently convicted in Schuylkill county of murder in the first degree. The execution takes place October 1st.

St. Louis, September 7.—C. E. Mellor, a prominent jeweller of Montreal, who absconded from there about two months ago, after making away with the stock of goods, is reported to have been arrested by his mother and Mrs. Dennis and Mr. Alex. McAlis and his wife. Mellor has been here since Saturday last and registered at the Planters House under an assumed name. McAlis and all the women were released, and Mellor is to be secured here, when he will be taken home. He had about \$1,000 in currency and a bar of gold weighing some five hundred pennyweights when arrested.

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Pacific Railroad at Auction. ST. LOUIS, September 7.—The Pacific Railroad will be sold at public auction under a foreclosure of mortgage, to-morrow. It is understood that Andrew Preble, Jr., purchaser of the Missouri and North-Western, is to buy the road, and an opinion prevails in railroad circles that these roads will be consolidated and operated under one management.

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
