The Judicial Election. With all the boasted jealousy of the American citizen in relation to the elective franchise, he is not over zealous at all times in the exercise of the cherished privilege.

We are led to these remarks from the fact that the bulk of our citizens are in absolute danger of forgetting that on Thursday next there is to be elected a Municipal Judge for the city of Wheeling.

Whoever is elected to the responsible position of Municipal Judge on next Thursday, should be chosen by a majority which will not leave him in doubt as to whether he is the choice of a majority of his fellow citizens.

Judge Gibson L. Cranmer, the present incumbent of the office, is so well known that he needs no commendation at our hands as a good citizen, while as a Judge he has evinced a thorough knowledge and a capacity for the duties of the office which have made him eminently acceptable to both the people and to the legal fraternity.

Raid on Underground Distilleries.

Gen. I. H. Dural, Collector of Internal Revenue of the First District of this State, embracing the First and Third Congressional Districts, has been giving special attention during the last thirty days to illicit distilleries in the southern and southeastern portion of his district.

During a raid of thirty days, almost constantly in the saddle, the party was "bushwhacked" on but one occasion, and then, although fired into from ambush by several persons with squirrel rifles, they escaped entirely unharmed.

The whole distance traveled by the raiders, most of which was on horseback, was not less than 1,250 miles. During the first fifteen days the raiding force kept together, but for the last fifteen days the party was divided, traveling in separate squads in different directions.

Of course, such a raid could not but stir up all the bitterness and revenge toward the government and its officers, harbored by those who have been years defying both, and systematically violating the law with impunity.

A Corner in Oil—The Formation of a Powerful Combination in Prospect.

It is announced and generally understood among the oil men that a powerful combination is about being formed, the object being to secure a monopoly of the transportation of the crude article from the producing centres and of the refining business at central points.

It is stated that the combination will be supported by from fifty to a hundred millions of capital. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company is said to be the influence through which the new association originates.

It is generally supposed that it is the aim of the Pennsylvania railroad company to take the oil business to Philadelphia, which aim, if accomplished, will greatly improve the commercial interest of that city.
