The Orangemen will Not Parade To-day.

Our Montreal dispatch shows that the apprehended collision between the Orangemen and Catholics of that city and vicinity to-day, has been provided against. There will be no procession of the Orangemen and consequently there will be no collision.

We cannot say that we admire this way of purchasing peace in a free country. All orders and associations that are lawful in their character should be free to parade the streets, one as well as another.

The Internal Commerce of the United States.

Perhaps no report that will come from the departments at Washington will attract more universal and interested attention than that bearing upon the internal commerce of the United States as related to its Railroad system.

From the first annual report of the internal commerce of the United States, just delivered by the Public Printer, we learn among other things, that the "value of the railroads of the United States is about twenty-three times the value of the shipping engaged in our foreign commerce, and that the value of our internal commerce is twenty-five times the value of our foreign commerce; that 57 per cent of the grain shipped from the West to the seaboard during the last year was transported on the rail lines, and that over 99 per cent of the entire internal commerce of the country is on the railroads.

The Chisholm Massacre.

Spanish Outrage on American.

BOSTON, July 11.—A letter from Capt. Taylor, of the whaling schooner Rising Sun, states that on the 20th of May, while cruising off the South Keys of Cuba, on the look out for whales, about 9 A. M. a school was sighted, and Capt. Taylor and his chief mate, Atkins, killed two whales, and were pursuing others, when he was fired upon by a Spanish cruiser and his chief mate taken prisoner and held as a hostage until the arrival of a Spanish gunboat.

Preparing to Suppress Riots.
