WASHINGTON, January 9.—A telegram to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, from Revenue Agent Wagner, dated Charlotte, N. C., to-day, is as follows: "I have directed the Sheriff of Union county to see the law enforced and propose to remove the trial Judge and disband the Militia Company implicated in the rescue of Federal prisoners at Sparta, N. C. We shall call on the Sheriff for a warrant and believe we shall be able to avoid trouble."

NEW YORK, January 8.—In the Stock Exchange this morning, it was stated that one member of the bull pool made sales to realize, and it appears that the large holders are parted with their stock. Under sales referred to, prices declined, but subsequently recovered sharply. Coal shares are well sustained, and the impression is becoming general that some arrangement will eventually be made by the companies to harmonize their interests.
