Louisiana Coming to Her Senses. Gov. Warmouth Calls for an Investigation of the Returning Board Trials.

The Language of the Louisiana Resolutions. General Anderson's Conviction a Violation of Both their Letter and Spirit.

Significant Opinion of Speaker Bush.

NEW ORLEANS, February 14.—The resolution introduced by ex-Gov. Warmouth, in the Louisiana Legislature yesterday, was discussed in the House today. It read as follows:

Resolved, That the Committee on Judiciary be directed to report without delay whether or not the prosecution of the officers of the late Returning Board is in violation of the pledge of the government made on the 20th of April, 1877, in words as follows:

"Desiring of healing the discussions that have disturbed the State for years past, and anxious that the citizens of all political parties may be free from the feverish anxieties of political strife and join hands in honestly restoring the prosperity of Louisiana, the Nicholls Government will discountenance any attempted persecution from any quarter of individuals for the past political conduct; that the government be requested to forward a copy of these resolutions to the President of the United States; that the committee shall have power to send for persons and papers and examine witnesses for the purposes of this report."

Mr. Jones defended the action of the law officer of the State, and denied that any pledge had been made that implied immunity for members of the Returning Board, or that any person or persons had authority to condone their offenses against the laws of Louisiana. That the charge on which Anderson was convicted was not a political offense, but was for the crime of forgery, which was a violation of criminal law.

Mr. Warmouth held that the joint resolution, approved April 20, was an act of oblivion by the law making power of the government for past political conduct; that it was understood to embrace all persons and accounts of a political character by which the Packard Government was sought to be sustained, and whilst no stipulation in words may have been made as to the members of the Returning Board it was clearly so understood by the Republicans, and to ignore or deny the fact now would be faith on the part of the Nicholls Government.

Speaker Bush said that he had well defined views on the question which he would express fearlessly when occasion required, but he now simply desired to say that Mr. Jones did not represent his opinion on the subject, and that he dissented from his views on Mr. Warmouth's motion.

No indications of Gov. Nicholls' intention concerning Anderson can be ascertained. He has scrupulously refused to intercede with the law officers and the friends, or to express his views. Intimate friends say he could not consistently, with his sense of duty, intercede. He will undoubtedly act independent of any interference on the part of Federal authority, and equally independent of domestic criticism.

Thank God and the Declaration of Independence, and the patriotic sentiment which it is vitalizing force, and the Constitution that crystallized it into law, the people of this country are furnished with a better method of righting wrongs and asserting rights than a resort to arms, and with less resolution and enthusiasm than the people were against oppression inspire, will they in peaceful methods and under the forms of law trample under foot any power that seeks through corruption or intimidation to intrude itself into this sacred territory.

Jones, of Nevada, Discusses the Silver Bill at Great Length.

SENATE. WASHINGTON, February 14. After a brief discussion, House joint resolution declaring that the repeal of the tax on distilled spirits is inexpedient was passed—yeas 49, nays 9.

Mr. Jones spoke at great length, the most of his speech being devoted to argument showing that silver is not depreciated in value since its demonetization, and against the assertions that the dollar proposed by the bill is dishonoring the medium of payment and a depreciated coin.
