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Curious Statement from a New Orleans Doctor.

We are indebted to Capt. William Campbell, of the steamer Lee, an old Wheeling boy, for late New Orleans papers, received yesterday. We notice in one of these papers the following report of a conversation between a newspaper reporter and a New Orleans physician:

Reporter.—Doctor, what is your opinion of the yellow fever now prevailing in the city—is it very bad?

Doctor.—It is very malignant in its character, and in my opinion has been epidemic for the past ten days. But I am confident that one-third of the cases reported are not yellow fever.

Reporter.—Doctor, the mortality among the children born in the city are likely to catch the malady?

Doctor.—Children who are born in New Orleans, within the limits of yellow fever, and a child who has lived during the ten first years of his life within these limits could afterwards go abroad, remain twenty years, and return with impunity, there being no danger of his getting the fever.

Reporter.—Well, Doctor, what in your opinion is the cause of the great mortality among the children this year?

Doctor.—Nothing but what is usually called the remittent bilious fever, from which they recover easily when medicated mildly and with moderation, as usually done in such cases. The great mortality is due to the fact that this bilious fever is misunderstood by some practitioners who use violent remedies, too violent for children, who are besides exposed to the powerful emanations of carbolic acid.

Reporter.—What is your opinion of the doctor who called upon you this morning, and the reporter who followed him?

Doctor.—The men who are inciting one class of the community against the other are fanning a flame that may yet devour themselves as well as those who are the target of their abuse.
