The Philadelphia wool market is quoted active this morning, and clips selling as fast as they arrive.

A number of the city physicians left town last evening to attend the meeting of the State Medical Society at Martinsburg to-day.

The Baltimore and Ohio road is selling round trip tickets to Fairmont, good until the 15th, at \$3.10, and to Winchester, Va., for \$10.

The next cotton crop of the United States fall twenty five per cent short in consequence of the exodus excitement it would entail a loss of a million and a quarter bales, which, at 11 cents per pound, would exceed the sum of \$22,500,000.

Col. DAN JOHNSON, of Tyler, was in the city yesterday en route to Morgantown, where he first attends the State Convention of the Baptists, and next the meeting of the Board of Regents of the University.

DR. PENDLETON, State Superintendent of Schools, accompanied by Judge Samuels, of Cabell county, and Dr. T. H. Logan, of this city, left last evening for Shepherdstown, Jefferson county, to attend the commencement of the State Normal School at that point.

MAINE claims to use less opiates in proportion to population than any other State in the Union. She points with pride to the fact that snuff-inhaling has become obsolete, and that snuff-dipping is almost unknown, except in some of the cities.

In the last report of the Auditor of Kentucky appear some interesting figures concerning the negroes in that State.

The statement of the property of negroes presents some very interesting features. There are accredited to them 181,129 acres of land (increase 14,000 acres), valued at \$1,275,200; 5,995 town lots (increase 400), valued at \$1,288,151; horses 14,945, valued at \$399,284; mules, 4,103, valued at \$153,289; jennets 73, valued at \$1,152; cattle, 7,659, valued at \$13,910; carriages, valued at \$7,992; watches, valued at \$6,082.

The editor of the Obolona States denounces the letter, purporting to be from him, which indicates that his paper is in Republican pay for campaigning purposes, as a forgery.

The terrible cyclonic storm which visited portions of Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri on Friday night was one of the most destructive to life and property that ever devastated that section.

Low Railroad Rates. Nails were billed yesterday from Wheeling to Chicago at 5 cents per keg, the lowest rate ever made, but not really as low as what was shipped from Chicago to New York last week, viz, 7 cents per hundred, or 4 cents per bushel.

A CARD. Editors Intelligencer: In the DAILY INTELLIGENCER of May 29 there appeared a very appreciable article from Philadelphia, containing an account of the M. E. ministerial meeting, May 26 and 27, and signed J. P. Sisson. The letter contained many facts, but not all the facts. It is only necessary to say that the dinner was prepared by those from the country who could not take their guests home to dinner and return in time for the afternoon service. The friends near by took their guests home with them for dinner. I state the above fact, that those who were not at the parsonage may understand why they were not invited. I now take pleasure in expressing my gratitude to all for the liberal manner in which they entertained the association.

The letter was not too highly colored, as to the appreciation of the friends or the performance of the association. It was a rich treat. We all enjoyed the meeting much. We should not object to have the parsonage invaded often in the same manner. Philadelphia, June 4th, 1879.
