We spoke on Monday of a movement on foot among some of the ex-soldiers here in Wheeling that looks to the purchase of a considerable body of land in the West with a view to settling on it such soldiers, and their families, as may be desirous of bettering their condition by emigration, but who are without the means either to buy land or remove to the cheap lands of the West. The scheme contemplates the settlement of a number of families on a large tract of land that shall belong to an association here, and also the providing of said families with the means to make a start, and reserves in the midst of the tract sufficient acreage for a village or town, which shall be the trading point of the settlement. As this land is settled it will become valuable, and the association will finally be reimbursed for its outlays on behalf of the settlers.

We are not aware how far the scheme has taken practical shape, nor upon what terms the land is to be finally disposed of to those who may settle it and render it productive and valuable, but for a number of years it is to be an undivided property, and during that time the settlers are to reap the rewards of their labor in some satisfactory shape.

Farming by wholesale, including the purchase of large bodies of land, seems to be a new and growing species of speculative industry in the West. Since the panic, what are known as "bonanza farms" have been opened out along the new railroads of the West. They compris large parcels of land, owned either by individuals or associations, and are mostly devoted to wheat raising. They are found principally in Kansas, Minnesota and Dakota, along the lines of the Atchinson Santa Fe and Topeka, the St. Paul and Sioux City, and the Northern Pacific rail-
